

EXPERT WILL REPORT ON BREAKWATER

Mr. Willis Chipman Will Tell
City How Best to Protect
West London.

WARREN CO. STOPS WORK

No Further Repairs Are To Be Made
on Talbot Street—Rinks in the
Parks.

Mr. Willis Chipman, consulting engineer, will be asked to report on the best methods of protecting the West London embankment. At the meeting of the board of works last evening, the question was brought up in connection with the report of City Engineer Brazier, on the best way of dealing with this problem, and the board was invited to have Mr. Chipman give his opinion on the question.

According to Mr. Brazier, there were two methods of protecting West London. The first, and the one he recommended, was to build a sloping gravel and earth embankment, faced with cement block or stone. The cost of this work would be \$24,000. The other was to build a vertical concrete wall, reinforced and piled, to protect the suburb. This would cost about \$60,000. Mr. Brazier thought the gravel embankment would be plenty good enough.

Ald. Moore advised the board to secure the services of an independent expert to report on the matter. "I suggested this earlier in the year," he said. "I think it the best possible thing to do, under the circumstances. Mr. Chipman is available at the present time, and we can secure his services at no great expense. I think we should be advised what is the best course to pursue."

Ald. Coles agreed with the proposition, and Mayor Graham and Chairman Robinson were named a committee to secure Mr. Chipman's services.

No More Repairs.
A communication was received from the Warren Fung Company, saying that owing to the cold weather it was impossible to complete the repairs on Talbot street this year. They had no objection to the city doing the work and charging it up to them.

"The guarantee on the Talbot street pavement expires this year," explained City Engineer Brazier. "I think we had better notify them to complete the repairs, and if they cannot do so this year, to obtain an agreement from them to do the work next spring."

This was agreeable to the board, and City Solicitor Meredith and Mr. Brazier were instructed to proceed in the matter.

More Room for Railway.
A number of plans were submitted, showing that it was necessary to remove the curbs and gutters at Horton and Richmond, Oxford and Richmond, Ridout and Elmwood, and other streets, in order to give the London street railway more room to make turns. The board recommended that the work be done, provided that the company pay the expense.

The G. T. R. Company refused to put in two flood-gates at the cove to take away the water in the spring-time, and the London street railway insisted in putting in one 30-inch tile to drain the cove, instead of a culvert 4 feet by 10, washed away in the flood last spring. City Engineer Brazier declared that it was necessary that something be done at once, and he was instructed to notify the companies to straighten out the tangle.

Rinks in Parks.
Ald. Coles was anxious to have skating rinks on the city parks, but as this matter was under the control of the parks commission, that body will be allowed to look after it.

Thomas Martin was awarded the contract for the Barwell street sewer, to cost \$475.20, and the Queens Place sewer, to cost \$425.50.

Those present were: Ald. Robinson, chairman; Ald. Moore, Ald. Coles, Ald. Elandford, Mayor Graham, City Engineer Brazier and Secretary Frank Hughes.

A THEATRE FOR CHILDREN

Only Institution of Its Kind Is To Be Opened in New York.

New York, Nov. 29.—A children's theatre, the only playhouse in the world devoted exclusively to the entertainment of children, is to be opened in New York next Monday. The funds for the enterprise were provided by Wm. K. Vanderbilt, but it is expected to be practically self-supporting.

The auditorium, which is placed on the roof of the building erected by Mr. Vanderbilt and others for their new

theatre enterprise, will seat 800 children, and has 12 boxes. The wall decorations are in nursery style and grant arched windows, looking out over Central Park, give it an abundance of pure fresh air.
