**CANADIANS MAY BE GIVEN FRIEDMAN CONSUMPTION CURE**

**Govt. Considering Sending Representative to Investigate the Vaccine.**

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—The Government has under consideration the sending of a representative to New York to investigate Dr. Friedman's cure for tuberculosis, and it is possible that they may invite him to visit Canada. This statement was made by the Premier in reply to Mr. A. K. MacLean, who moved the adjournment of the sitting for the purpose of discussing the subject. Mr. MacLean said that even if only partially effective Dr. Friedman's cure would be a great blessing to the human race. The United States Government had sent a surgeon of its Government service to welcome the German physician on his arrival. Mr. MacLean suggested that Canada should send a qualified physician to confer with Friedman and possibly invite him to visit Canada to give demonstrations at a central point.

**Under Consideration.**  
Mr. Borden answered that the subject had already been under consideration. Whether or not anything effective could be done by carrying out Mr.

McClellan's suggestion might be questioned. He would imagine that the effectiveness of Dr. Friedman's remedy would require a good deal of time to demonstrate it, and a visit to New York might not have very practical results. He did not know whether Dr. Friedman would have time to visit Canada. In any case the Government would give the suggestion its best consideration. There was no difference of opinion as to the desirability of a full test of the remedy; and any Government which did not take every reasonable step to investigate would be derelict in its duty.

Following the Premier's statement the motion for adjournment was declared lost and the business of the day went on.  
Sir Wilfrid Laurier asked whether it was true that Stefansson would undertake an expedition in the Arctic under the Canadian Government.  
Mr. Borden answered in the affirmative.  
Mr. Stefansson would explore lands over which Canada claimed sovereignty. The expedition had first been projected by American scientists and had been requested from Canada. It had been deemed advisable that the expedition should be entirely under the control of Canada and the American scientists had waived their claim. It was probable that some of these scientists would accompany Stefansson.

**300 FARMERS APPLY FOR A "HIRED MAN"**

**Salvation Army Is Also Simply Swamped With Requests For Domestic.**

Major Morris, who is in charge of the local Salvation Army, stated to The Advertiser Thursday that already there are more than 300 applications in from farmers all over the district, asking for men to help on the farms. "We expect to bring a great many immigrants to this district," he told The Advertiser. "There will also be a number of girls brought out as domestics. We are simply deluged with inquiries for female help. The army intends bringing out many thousands of people this year, but the great majority of them will go to the west."

"Some of the men who came out and went on farms did not like the work," he said, "and drifted into the city. We have had several complaints from men of this sort regarding the poor wages paid in London. It is a pretty hard struggle for a man, with a wife and two or three little children, to make things go on \$9 a week. Only Wednesday I had a case to deal with where complaint was made that one of the men was dishonest. I knew the man well and there is not a more honest fellow anywhere. I was told he was not paying back some money that had been advanced. On investigating I found that the man was making \$11 a week. He has a wife and five little ones to keep. With living expenses the way they are, he naturally could not pay by very much. He will pay the money all right, though."

**PASTOR RUSSELL AGAIN IN COURT**

**His Business Life Aired During Action Taken by New York City.**

New York, Feb. 28. — Mrs. Marla Frances Russell, who is separated from her husband, Pastor Russell, of the Brooklyn Tabernacle, was a witness against her husband today at a hearing before the city tax commission. Pastor Russell is claiming exemption from taxation of his many publications and business enterprises on that ground that all his activities are philanthropic and religious. Mrs. Russell, who obtained a separation from her husband on the ground that he treated her cruelly, said that when Pastor Russell started the Zion Watchtower Society in Pittsburg she was entirely in his confidence as his principal aid. She said that he sold memberships in the society at \$10 each, and that at the last election in Pittsburg of which she had knowledge 50,000 membership votes were cast, indicating that the society had taken in \$500,000.

Pastor Russell, so his wife testified, also had William Van Amberg, secretary and treasurer of most of the concerns under the Russell management, buy land near Pittsburg for a cemetery at a cost of many thousands of dollars. The stock of the cemetery was sold to the plots. The cemetery company was merged into the United States Investment Company, a holding corporation for Dr. Russell under a contract which stipulated that only 10 per cent. of the profits of the cemetery should go to the cemetery corporation and that 90 per cent. should go to the United States Investment Company. Secretary Van Amberg stated that his salary as secretary and treasurer of the Russell concerns was only \$11 a month. He could get work at a better salary elsewhere, he said; but stayed with Pastor Russell "because he loved the work."

**OLD-FASHIONED TEA WAS A GREAT SUCCESS**

**Petrolia Methodist Ladies' Aid Entertained Over Four Hundred Guests.**

**TRAFFIC BYLAW WINS IN CARLING ST. COURT**

**Magistrate Fines Drayman for Leaving Horse Unattended On York Street.**

Charles Wright, a local drayman, was fined \$3 with 15c costs in police court Thursday for a breach of the traffic bylaws in having allowed his horse to stand unattended in front of his place of business on York street for a period of 15 minutes. A written decision was given out by the magistrate, as a nice point of law was involved in the case, which was heard on Tuesday morning. Mr. E. W. Scatcherd, who appeared for the defendant, contended that Section 18 of Bylaw 750, under which the charge was laid, was practically repealed by a subsequent bylaw passed by the council, in which Dundas and Richmond streets were specified as the area in which vehicles could not be left standing for an unreasonable length of time. The court, in its decision, held that there was no inconsistency between the two bylaws, and further that the dray had been left standing on the street for an unreasonable period. Wright was accordingly found guilty.

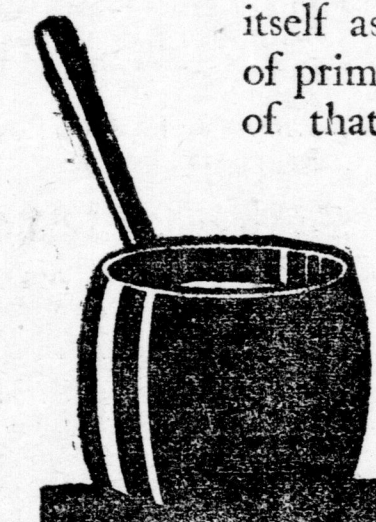

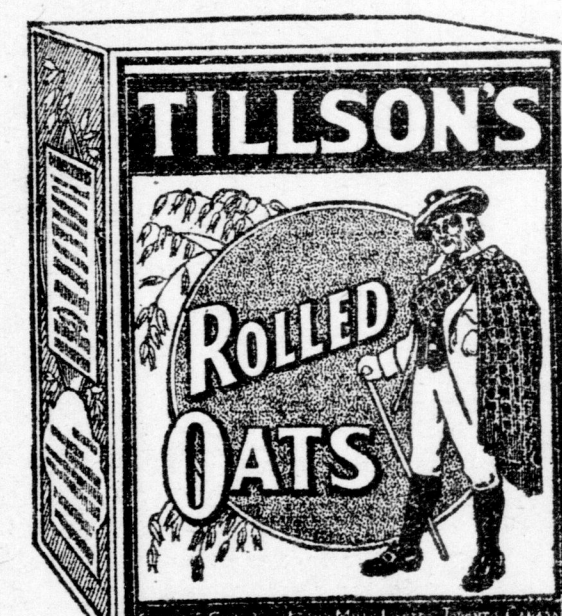
