ALLEGED "DIPS" ARE REARRESTED IN U. S.

Men Deported From London to Border "Pinched" Again at Port Huron.

Deported to Port Huron, Maurice Weinert, Joseph Harris and Charles Beliger, discharged in the local police court yesterday, were promptly re-arrested on their arrival in the border town last evening, and the London police were notified that the men would be held a week and would be sent back here in case any new evidence should be secured against them.

The trio were arrested on Dominion Day by Detectives Harry Down and Robert Egleton, when they were seen mingling unnecessarily in every crowd that collected on the Grand Trunk platform.

They were suspected of being "dips," but in the absence of direct evidence, they were held as vagrants.

In the local police court, they were ordered to be deported, but before putting them on a fast train for Port Huron, Chief Williams wired the Immigration officials at Sarnia to see that they got across the line all right, and to the Port Huron police announcing their return to Uncle Sam's domains.

Last evening, word was received back that the Port Huron police had arrested the trio on a technical charge, and would probably hold them for several days.

FRENCH SUBMARINE SUNK BY DESTROYER DURING MANOEUVRES

Vessel Goes to Bottom and May Be Lost—All the Crew Are Saved.

TOULON, France, July 7.—The French submarine Calypso was sunk today by the destroyer Mosqueton during manoeuvres. The crew of the Calypso were saved.

It is thought that it will be impossible to save the submarine on account of the great depth at which she is lying.

The Calypso was navigating on the surface at the time of the collision and most of the men were on deck. The shock was severe and a great hole was torn in the submarine's side.

The boat sank in a few minutes. A heavy sea was running at the time, but the other warships carried out the rescue work with great skill and daring.

The Mosqueton was badly damaged and put into port. The admiral's command has ordered a court of inquiry to investigate the disaster.

OTTAWA EMPLOYEES MUST BE ABSTAINERS

Mayor Issues Order Forbidding Any to Enter Barroom On Or Off Duty.

OTTAWA, July 7.—Mayor McVeety tonight issued an order to the heads of the civic departments, instructing them to notify their various staffs that drinking will not hereafter be countenanced among employees of the corporation.

His worship's mandate states that any employee or head of department who enters a public drinking place or bar-room will be penalized.

The order is in effect whether the employee is on or off duty.

CARRYING OF RIFLES VIOLATES REGULATIONS

Colonel Hughes Believes All Religious Bodies Will Desist From Using Them

OTTAWA, July 7.—The Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, has addressed an open letter to the Orange order, in reply to resolutions passed by several lodges of that body, protesting against the participation of the Sixty-fifth Regiment in recent Corpus Christi ceremonies in Montreal.

Colonel Hughes pays a high tribute to the Orange order, and says, "But this is not the first time I have calmly faced the wrath of a few fanatics, yet I have lived to be endorsed, and justified, by every sensible man in the Orange order."

The minister expressed the belief that the religious authorities will desist from carrying rifles in religious processions when they learn that it is in violation of the regulations.

ON GUARD DUTY AT CADET CAMP

L. C. I. CADETS WIN SHOOTING TROPHY

For Second Time Local Corps Captures Beck Silver Shield.

BOYS ARE ENJOYING CAMP

Veteran Cadets Have Fun With Recruits Who Are Camping for First Time.

A team of twelve London boys yesterday afternoon successfully defended their title as holders of the Beck trophy for rifle shooting, defeating teams from Waterloo, Chatham, Essex and Galt at the cadet camp at Carling's Heights. Shooting at 200 and 500 yards, London, Waterloo and Chatham ran each other pretty close, but the final count showed the local boys just a few points ahead, with Waterloo next.

When the London boys won the silver shield last year it was claimed that they had had an advantage in being allowed to use their own rifles, while their competitors were supplied with weapons only. This year, however, all rifles were supplied from the store, so that all the contestants were on an equal footing in that respect.

Waterloo Boys Do Well.

Waterloo's showing was remarkably good in view of the fact that few of the boys comprising the team had used rifles at all previously. Some of them even did not know how the breech-blocks worked.

At one time Seaford was a pretty consistent winner of the Beck shield, but a few years ago a boy was killed accidentally in the Seaford ranges, and since then shooting has become almost a lost art in the town, the boys even created something of a prejudice against the use of firearms.

This afternoon teams from several of the companies will shoot-off for the Barnard trophy, and on Thursday afternoon a skirmishing and firing competition will be held.

For this the boys are arranged in open order, each team firing at its own target, which appears suddenly in front of them at an unknown distance, remaining stationary for fifteen seconds and then disappearing again.

Except the youngsters taking part in the shooting competition, those taking advanced flag-signaling instruction, and the company on guard duty, all the boys were free during yesterday afternoon, and devoted their time to their own amusements.

Half a dozen baseball games were played. Some of the youngsters indulged in football practice, some came downtown for a swim in the sulphur bath plunge, others visited the ice cream parlours in the city, and others still were content to remain in camp, and patronize the ice cream and soft drink stand, run under the direction of the Y. M. C. A.

Peanuts Prohibited.

Here may be purchased ice cream cones, watermelon, drinks, popcorn—but not peanuts. One of the officials volunteered the reason for the latter prohibition. He said: "We want to have as many boys as possible in the city, and a combination of ice cream, watermelon and peanuts has been found to be too deadly, even for boys, and so the peanuts have been eliminated."

All the boys must be back in camp for supper time. As a matter of fact this order is hardly necessary, for the open air life of the camp produces an appetite which practically insures the presence of every cadet at meal time. To watch the boys stow away eatables is a sight to be remembered.

No Casualties So Far.

So far, incidents of an unpleasant character have been unknown. Up to the present not a single boy has been injured, lost or seized with illness, a rather remarkable thing, when it is remembered that there are close to one thousand boys in the camp.

After supper the boys must stay within the camp bounds unless they have special permission from their instructors to do otherwise. In any case they must be in before "lights out" is sounded at 9:30.

At 4:30 last evening the London contingent paraded, and escorted by the bugle band of the Stratford company,

A. tent, thence to the store's department, and so on, until he was so bemuddled that he hardly knew what he was doing.

Crucel? Of course it is, but the boys who play these jokes have been subjected to the same kind of things themselves in their "greener" days, and besides, they don't realize that there is any cruelty in it. It is just an exuberance of boyish spirit. No harm is intended and, as a matter of fact, none results. The victim usually enjoys the job when he realizes it just as much as do the perpetrators.

MOTOR BUSES FOR STRATFORD STREETS

[Special to The Advertiser.]
STRATFORD, July 7.—The Stratford Council tonight entered into an agreement with a Brantford promoter to give this city a street motor bus service. The service will be begun in about fifteen days by a joint stock company, which has been awaiting the decision of the city council before becoming incorporated.

The company is granted the exclusive right to run motor buses on the streets of Stratford on and after July 25, 1914. It agrees to operate three motor buses of between 30 and 40-horsepower, with a passenger capacity of fourteen each.

Service Six to Eleven.

The buses are to run between 6 a.m. and 11 p.m. each day, each bus to complete at least once every half hour, one of a series of circuits mapped out by the company and the city engineer.

The company may have a midnight service, for which it is not to charge more than the taxicab fee fixed by the police commission, but its tariff for the day traffic is not to be more than 5 cents between any two points in the city.

The city charges it a license of \$50 per year for each bus. A street car service coming into the city will automatically make void the agreement, as will also the failure of the company to pay its fees.
