### MOTOR BUSSES FOR STRATFORD STREETS

[Special to The Advertiser.] STRATFORD, July 7.—The Stratford Council tonight entered into an agree-ment with a Brantford promoter to give this city a street motor bus service. The service will be begun in about fifteen days by a joint stock company, which has been awaiting the decision of the city council before becoming incorporated.

The company is granted the exclusive right to run motor buses on the streets of Stratford on and after July 25, 1914. It agrees to operate three motor buses of between 30 and 40horsepower, with a passenger capacity of fourteen each. Service Six to Eleven.

The buses are to run between 6 a.m. and 11 p.m. each day, each bus hour, one of a series of circuits mapped
