Constantinople, June 11.—Greek destroyers have bombarded Kareausel, a village on the southern shore of the Gulf of Ismid. and there have been several skirmishes along the Turkish front in Asia Minor. Coast towns along the Black Sea, the Sea of Marmora and the Aegean Sea were filled with refugees who have fled from the interior because of the offensive against the Turkish

The Turkish Nationalist Government has requested the Italians not to evacuate Adalia, on the southern coast of Asia Minor, exressing fear that the British may use the new docks there as a pase, and that they will cut off communications between Angora and Europe. The Angora Government has replied to the British note relative to the execution of Mustapha Sachir, an Indian British subject, declaring he was tried by court-martial and convicted Huron, Bruce and Middlesex of plotting the assassination of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, head of the Nationalist Government.
