#### Canada's Budget.

The budget speech delivered by Hon. J. A. Robb falls into three sections: (1) the financial standing and progress of the country; (2) the lessening of the sales tax and the decrease in taxation; (3) the reduction in tariff on the machinery of production required for the development of the basic industries of the country, such as farming, fruit growing, poultry, dairying, mining, lumbering, fishing.

The figures show that the public debt has been decreased by \$30,409,-000; the meaning of this is all the more apparent when it is considered that for years past it has steadily been increasing. A definite move Hugo Stinnes. toward decreasing the public debt is healthy legislation. The government is to be commended for every move that seeks to cut down the load that is at the bottom of all our taxation problems. The estimate that there will be a reduction in taxes of \$24,000,000 is part and parcel of the same policy.

The sales tax has been lowered from 6 to 5 per cent, and on many lines further reduced. On foodstuffs such as cereals, macaroni, sago, rice, meats, the sales tax is removed. It is reduced to 21/2 per cent on biscuits, jams, preserved fruits, etc. while a similar reduction is ordered on boots and shoes and rubber footwear. From milk foods the tax is

The intent of this legislation is to give the people cheaper food, boots, an opportunity right now to play a shoes, etc. It may take a little time big part well. for the effect to become apparent, as many stocks have been purchased on the 6 per cent basis of cost. There should be a willingness on the part of distributors to pass this benefit on to the consumer at the earliest possible opportunity, because they must realize that lower prices are necessary for better trade.

Mr. Robb, in dealing with the tariff on implements used in the development of basic industries, found himself faced with the problem of giving assistance to men en gaged in these vocations, while at the same time seeking to work as little hardship as possible on industries engaged in the production of these implements. The tariff on agricultural implements has been reduced.
