The London Times' correspondent in
Paris says the last mail from Madagascar
reports that George S. Muller, the explorer
sent out by the French Government on a
scientific mission, has been murdered be-
tween Annamavio, the capital of the
Island, and Majunga.

Many Were Drowned.
Despatches to the Times from Paris say
that the delta Torquin was entirely flooded
by a hurricane recently, which swept
away many dwellings. A number of
their occupants escaped on rafts, but
many were drowned. The vicar apostolic
has issued a pressing appeal for funds to
avenge a famine, as the crops were ruined
by the hurricane.

Bismarck's Condition.
Prince Bismarck's condition remains
about the same; he passes most of his time
upon a couch reading novels and news-
papers. The Prince remarked to his
physician, Dr. Schweigger, yesterday, that
the newspapers ought to be very grateful
to him for giving so much copy in the
last session.

Bankrupt by Cholera.
A St. Petersburg despatch says:—The
town of Baku, capital of the Government
of that name on the Caspian Sea, has be-
come practically bankrupt, owing to the
costly anti-cholera regulations enforced by
the Government. The peninsula of
Aspheron, upon which Baku is situated,
is noted for its petroleum springs, and
Baku is the principal port of Russia for
export of that commodity.

The Matabele Men War.
A despatch from Cape Town says the
Matabele have fired again on the police of
the South African Republic Company.
As in July the attack was made near Fort
Victoria, the Matabele force has been
increased rapidly in the last six weeks,
and is now estimated at about 7,000 men.
Chief Lobegala is exceedingly belligerent,
and an attack on Fort Victoria is likely to
be made.
