New Brunswick and Nova Scotia both increased in population. The increase was small, practically nothing in New Brunswick, and only 9,951, or 21/4 per cent., in Nova Scotia; but it was an increase, and it was a better showing on the whole than made by the adjoining states of the American Union. 
