INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM.

Sir.—In answer to your inquiry in the Colonist of the 19th inst as to what the initiative is, and where it is in vogue, I send these particulars: The initiative in its commonest form is the "I move" of the ordinary meeting. In New England town meetings it is used in this somewhat informal way, and there the citizens assembled do the business left to city councils or municipal councils in other places. In a state or nation the plan is thus: A reasonable per cent of the votes, say five per cent may draw up and sign a demand for certain legislation, specified in the demand, and when presented to the legislature they must act upon it. If their action is not satisfactory the referendum can be used. In 1874 the following very short amendment was inserted in the Swiss constitution: "On the request of 30,000 citizens, federal bills are to be submitted to the people for adoption, or rejection." That began the referendum. Later on a similar clause provided that they might "initiate" bills. In federal affairs the initiative was introduced in 1891, but the Canton of Zurich had adopted it in 1867. Other cantons have followed, and Geneva adopted the initiative three or four years ago. I am also informed that the initiative and referendum is in force in South Dakota.
