Fredericton, Sept. 3.—Word 'was received by Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison yesterday that a party in Madwaska County had been arrested by fishery guardians for fishing trout with a net. Trout-fishing with nets is strictly against the Federal law and is punishable by heavy penalty. The nets, fish, cance and other gear of the party were seized and in their tent was ed. The party is also liable to the forests of New Brunswick out of season. The case will probably cours before the courts next week. Overseer J. A. D. Robertson left the city today to assist the provincial authorities at Grand Falls in investigating the case. It is not known how severely they will be dealt with. This is not the first case of illegal trout fishing in Madawaska County.






