

Basis of the Conference—What Arabi Pasha Threatens to Do-The Sultan Wants to See Him. Paris, June -22. -In the chamber of eputies, DeFreycinet said that France and

England had given their ambassadors instructions fixing as a basis of the conference the re-establishment of the rights of the sultar, the maintenance of the rights of the khedive, the preservation of the liberies of the Egyptians, and the observance ties of the Egyptians, and the observance of the international engagements of Egypt. The powers would sign a protocol forbidding them to seek any advantage outside of the basis of the conference. The government had in no degree resigned their independence. If contrary to all expectations, they found themselves confronted by a solution inconsistent with their dignity, they would resume liberty of action, but they were convinced that the existing accord would continue.

ALEXANDRIA, June 22—The Egyptian ministry were yesterday informed that the British government refused to recognize them, and was determined to carry out the them, and was determined to carry out the terms of the ultimatum, and in addition to demand reparation for all that had taken place lately. Yesterday Douad Pasha, father of the commandant of troops at Alexandria, appeared before the khedive. It was reported that two heats containing the was reported that two boats containing the fugatives were upset, and the occupants drowned. Douad thanked God for the dis-

drowned. Douad thanked God for the disaster. The khedive was shocked, and remonstrated, saying that the christians had souls. Douad cursed all christians, saying he hoped all would have the same fate. Turning to leave he attempted to kiss the khedive's hand, but the latter refused. The khedive's hand, but the latter refused. The commission of enquiry is not going on as rapidly as hitherto, and is not giving signs of a desire to punish the rioters. That Arabi will have virtual control of the new ministry is no secret. Now that the agents of Germany, Austria and Italy do not agree with the English and French agents it seems likely they will support Arabi. The greatest

they will support Arabi. The greatest anxiety is felt lest the khedive be deposed, leaving Arabi master of the situation.
