THE GO-TO-CHURCH CAMPAIGN

A Church Attendance campaign is now being held throughout Ontario as a follow up to the Forward Movement held some months ago, and is being enthusiastically pushed forward because of the great success of the financial phase. "The prompt and liberal vote of ways and means that followed the appeal for funds" says the Mail and Empire, "put heart into church workers in all the communities enlisted in the Forward Movement. The real work of the movement was then entered upon."

The first thing to be done under the plan of campaign is to get the churches filled with worshippers. The next thing is to keep them filled. In all the Protestant churches therefore there is now at work a strong corps of active members in behalf of church attendance. These workers are serving their churches well, and benefiting the people they are rousing out of the Sunday-stay-at-home habit, and in so far as they are making people more Christian they are lifting to a higher plane the public opinion underlying political government. There is much to correct in the way of life most of us at the present time are following. We are too much absorbed in material objects, in pursuit of wealth, in dreams of luxurious living. Public opinion is too tolerant of lapses from old standards of decency. Society is getting down-at-the-heel in a moral sense. Irreverence, rebellion against work, and disrespect for conventions that have the strongest religious sanction are among the evils of the time, to be corrected only by the keying up of Christianity as a force in society. The movement to bring people to church ought to be warmly responded to by the people, and the work of those who bring people into the church should be clinched by the earnest, pious and efficient labors of the clergy. Ministers of the gospel are expected to rise to the opportunity this Forward Movement of the laity presents, and to deliver sermons that will make the right kind of impression upon their hearers. In many pulpits there is great need for change in this respect.

ROBERT STEAD'S NEW ROMANCE

Robert Stead, once of Calgary, now of the Civil Service, in Ottawa, is today second only to Ralph Connor in popularity as a Canadian romanticist. Like the author of "The Sky Pilot," he has chosen the west as his stamping ground. From his early boyhood he lived in the prairie country and no one knows all its many-sided life better than he does. Out of this adventurous region came his first novels, "The Bail Jumper," and "The Homesteaders." His last novel, "The Cow Puncher," is also wholly Western in its atmosphere and action. His new story, "Dennison Grant," so-called from the name of the hero, offers some variation on his previous novels in that it shifts from east to west and from west to east, just as its author himself has done. The opening chapters are laid in the ranching country of Alberta and describe the tragic rivalry of the Y.D. gang and the Grant gang in their contention for the hay rights in a wild valley in the foothills of the Rockies. It was in the course of this exciting melee that Dennison Grant first came into touch with old Y.D.'s daughter, the wilful and vivacious Zen, the most attractive of all Stead's heroines. The story swings from Alberta to an eastern city, which has no name but is probably Toronto, then back to Alberta once more. The climax is remarkably free from conventionality and will thrill the reader with its passion and unusual dramatic situations. An intensely interesting love story, this romance is bound to be one of the big sellers of the season. It is published by the Musson Book Company of Toronto.
