

FERTILIZERS—"Made at Windsor, N. S."

During the past month we have had numerous requests from the farmers and fruit growers in the Annapolis Valley for the address of our nearest agent where they can get the "Made at Windsor, N. S." fertilizers. This request as a rule came from those who have used our fertilizer exclusively the past several years and have had such good results from the use of it they do not want to make any change. Others are from those who have not been using our fertilizer but from year to year we are adding new customers not only in the Annapolis Valley, but in all sections where our brands are offered.

Most of those writing to us are interested particularly this year in buying fertilizer made in Canada and more especially fertilizers made here. They do not feel they should go outside for anything that they can buy which is made here and they know they can depend upon getting from us the best of materials in good shape and delivery when they want it.

The Canadian Reconstruction Association which was organized immediately at the close of the war for the purpose of doing what it could to get things back to normal conditions in its recent issue calls particular attention to the necessity of everyone spending his money at home and not going outside for anything he can buy here. The latest pamphlet issued by them refers particularly to the importance not only of supporting the industries that are already here but attracting foreign capital to develop to the full possibilities all branches of industrial activities.

Everyone has read in the daily papers during the last year that an immense amount of money is sent out of the country for imported articles. This is due to two reasons. One a more or less tendency to feel that there is something in the word "Imported" and the other to fact that there are so many things which it is necessary to import because they are not made in Canada.

Along the same line and for the same purpose the Canadian Manufacturers Association says that now is the time above all others that every man should examine everything he pur-

chases and find out whether or not it is made in Canada and if there is any reason why it should not be a Made in Canada product when he can get it on equally advantageous terms.

The early part of March we mailed to all the customers on our books and to a large number of users of fertilizer a poster showing our complete plant. This was mailed at the beginning of our 9th year of operation, to give our customers and others an idea of the size of the works of the "Made at Windsor, N. S." fertilizers. This plant is the largest plant in Canada for the manufacture of complete fertilizers. It gives employment to from 50 to 100 men and has been continuously in operation since starting. We maintain a travelling and office force and spend for wages in all departments, together with local supplies in the way of coal, barrel stock and materials all of kinds necessary to conduct a business of this size, upwards of \$100,000.00 yearly.

It is industries like this that the Canadian Reconstruction Association and the Canadian Manufacturers Association call the material life of the country and which they ask the people to support. It is only by buying "Made in Canada" goods that further industrial developments can take place and indeed will it be possible to continue present industries or at least to run them to anything like their full capacity.

Under the present industrial conditions the most serious difficulty is that of unemployment. Every person who buys a "Made in Canada" product assists in reducing unemployment, while every purchase of imported goods adds to that difficulty.

We have arranged to have "Made at Windsor, N. S." fertilizer on sale at most of the principal centres in the Annapolis Valley. The price will be as low as you can buy similar goods from anyone else and the terms will be as advantageous. We believe that our goods will be in better mechanical condition, packages in better shape and it will be in every particular superior to that which you can buy from anywhere else.

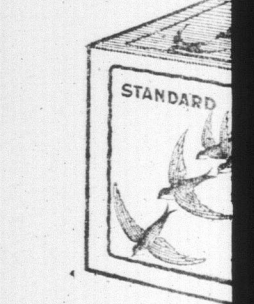
