REMOVE flower-pot stains from window sills by rubbing with fine wood ashes and rinse with clean water.

DO NOT cut lamp wicks, but trim them by wiping off with a scrap of paper.

ORDINARY newspapers are very impervious to cold. If apples are to be shipped during winter, line the barrels with two or three thicknesses of paper, and the apples will rarely freeze, if properly protected.

A VERY simple but often efficacious cure for bunions is a poultice of cold bread and water at night, and in the morning rub with olive oil, and place a small piece of gauze over the bunion to keep it moist.

CREAM CAKE WITHOUT EGGS. — Four cups of flour, three eggs of sugar, one cup of butter, two cups of sour cream, three teaspoonsfuls of saleratus dissolved in a little water, half grated nutmeg, and a teaspoonful of essence of lemon.

A HAND-SOME cover for a sofa pillow is made by enclosing two strips of blue satin with pink roses and some fine green foliage; alternate these strips with velvet or plush of a contrasting color; a dark crimson is particularly pretty with the blue.

FIELD ATE SOUP. — Boil a small cup of rice in a little water a part of milk. Boil until it is so soft that it will pass through a sieve. Grate the nicely blanched parts of two heads of celery and add to the strained rice; add to this rice, one strong beef stock, or that made from mutton or veal may be used; it should be strained, and be clear and free from fat; when it is put in with the rice. Let the boil until the celery is tender. Season with a dash of cayenne pepper, or a little cayenne powder, and plenty of salt.

COTTAGE Pudding. — Three eggs, two cupsfuls of Jefferson sugar, four large teaspoonsfuls of butter, half a pint of sweet milk, one pint of cream, and two teaspoonsfuls of baking powder. Work the butter to the lightest possible cream, beat the eggs separately, and mix the yolking the same as in directions for cake making. Take half an hour. This quantity will make two cakes of the proper size. There is no better recipe than this for this favorite pudding. To be served hot with sauce.

BREAKFAST DINNER. — An excellent dish is made of six eggs and three tablespoonsfuls of ham chopped very fine; beat the eggs, and after adding a little salt, stir in the frying-pan drop the egg mixture and stir the ham; the ham has of course been cooked, either fried or boiled; season with pepper. This is a good way to use up pieces of meat that are left from dinner. A nice dish for breakfast or tea is made of sweet potatoe baked. Remove the skins, rub the potatoes through a coarse colander, make into tea cakes, dip into salt and fry in the butter.

BREAD MORSEL. — (A KITCHEN INN.) — Set well together the yolks of two eggs, and three ounces of powdered sugar, mix in two measure of grated beet, one spoonful of powdered ginger, and the whites of four eggs whisked to a stiff snow scented lightly; at last have a nice & well flavored, speckled in its surface nicely sliced blanched almonds, and lay here and there the slice of candied peel. Eat the morsel with the mouth and season it with sugar. Eat sugar to a thread bright and pure it will when the knot is taken out of the thread. Serve it without delay.

HORSEFESTE'S WEDDING AND MEASURES. — Two gills make a half peat. Two peats make one quart. Four quarts make one gallon. Half a gallon is a quarter of a peat. Two gallons make one peat. Four gallons make half a bushel. Eight gallons make one barrel. About sixty drops of any thin liquid will fill a common-sized teacup. Four teacups, or one half a gill, will fill a common-sized water-jug. Four water-jugs will fill a half peat measure, a common timber, or a large coffee cup. Tea eggs usually weigh one pound before they're broken. A tablespoonful of salt weighs one ounce.


