FEDERAL-PROVINCIAL FISCAL ARRANGEMENTS AND ESTABLISHED PROGRAMS FINANCING ACT, 1977

MEASURE TO AMEND

Hon. Roy MacLaren (for the Minister of Finance) moved that Bill C-12, an Act to amend the Federal-Provincial Fiscal Arrangements and Established Programs Financing Act, 1977, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs.

He said: Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this Bill is to bring certain fiscal transfers to the provinces into conformity with the government's anti-inflation program, the "six and five" program. As a result of this Bill, federal assistance to each province for post-secondary education will be increased by 6 per cent in 1983-84 and by an additional 5 per cent in 1984-85. Other federal transfer payments to the provinces will not be affected. In particular, transfers in respect of hospital insurance and medical care will continue to grow in line with the increases in Canada's Gross National Product, which has become known as the GNP escalator.

Hon. Members will agree that the six and five program has contributed substantially to the reduction in the rate of inflation in Canada. Since the program was announced more than 18 months ago, the annual rate of inflation had declined from 11.2 per cent to 4.5 per cent.

Mr. Blenkarn: Nonsense.

Mr. MacLaren: Hon. Members will recognize that it is desirable to ensure that the benefits of the six and five program are as pervasive through our economy as it is possible to make them.

Hon. Members may note first that we are changing the title of the Act. Formerly it was the "Federal-Provincial Fiscal Arrangements and Established Programs Financing Act, 1977". In the hope of clarifiying the purposes of the Act the title is now being changed to the "Federal-Provincial Fiscal Arrangements and Federal Post-Secondary Education and Health Contributions Act, 1977".

Ms. McDonald: That should help students a lot.

Mr. MacLaren: The purpose of this change is to clarify the fact that the federal Government contributes huge amounts to the provinces. Over \$13.5 billion was contributed for 1983-84 to assist the provinces in financing post-secondary education and health programs. Hon. Members will agree, I am sure, in light of the huge transfers, that it is fitting for the title of the Act to recognize explicitly the areas to which such federal contributions are directed.

As I have noted, Mr. Speaker, the federal transfers under these arrangements are immense. In 1982-83, over \$12 billion was transferred to the provinces. For 1983-84 over \$13.5 billion, and for 1984-85 over \$14.7 billion will be transferred. Federal transfers to the provinces to assist them in financing post-secondary education is one of the four component programs. For the 1982-83 fiscal year over \$3.7 billion was transferred to the provinces for post-secondary education. For 1983-84 almost \$4 billion will be transferred, and in 1984-85 some \$4.2 billion. Accordingly, the amounts transferred for post-secondary education will grow by over \$263 million in 1983-84 after this Bill has been passed, and by an additional \$239 million in 1984-85.

Federal support for post-secondary education has brought significant benefit since this program began in 1967. Over the years the national Government has also introduced other
