at Cincinnati, in 1836, after examining the facts, declined to recommend the recognition of the Canadian M. E. Church as the representative of the original M. E. Church of Canada; that in 1837 all the surviving ministers of the American Methodist Church, who had been present at the organization of that Church, also Eishop Hedding, Dr. Fisk and other eminent ministers in the United States, declared their explicit conviction that the change of name and substitution of an annual president for a bishop, and other changes, did not destroy the identity of the Canadian Methodist Church; that the highest Canadian court of law gave a similar decision in the Church property trials; and that the original seceders were at first only dissatisfied about some limitation of the privileges of local preachers, the formation of an independent Church being an afterthought. No art can destroy the force of these facts." * * * -Christian Guardian.

DR. CARROLL'S "NEEDED EXPOSITION."
