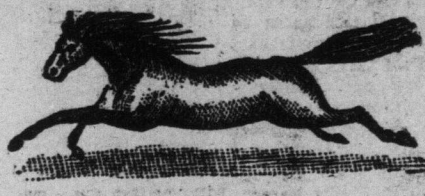

The twentieth annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Football Union will be held this afternoon at the King Edward Hotel, at 2.30.

There are several amendments for consideration, the principal one being a proposal to give one three points for a touch-down secured from a fumble behind the line. It will also be considered whether advisable to allow substitutes at any time. Dave Tope's motion to bring the wall to the ten-yard line instead of to

centre after a field goal, will be considered; also the kick-off and kick-off rules and several others.

There will also be the election of officers. The Intercollegiate representatives will likely be Hugh Gail, George Klugston and W. C. Foulds; the O.R.F.U. delegates, A. R. Denison, W. A. Hewitt and Ed. McGillivray; Interprovincial delegates, Jos. Wright, Dave Tope and George Ballard.
