PRICE CURRENT'S ESTIMATE

Chicago, Sept. 4.—The Price Current says: Rains in the spring wheat territory have lowered quality of grain to some extent, but the yields secured are above what the conditional figures indicate, and suggest a crop of around \$30,000,000 bushels, or \$,000,000 bushels more than indicated by the government August report. The corn crop is probably about 400,000,000 bushels less than the August estimate, and below the average of the past five years. Threshing returns on oats. years.
