During Crush of Visitors Yesterday, Expert Thieves Make a Most Daring Haul.

As the result of some fast work on the part of shoplifters yesterday Ryrie Bros. report \$4000 in rings and stick pins as missing. The method of operation is a mystery. The time of the robbery has been placed at between 4 and 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

The theft was discovered at 6 o'clock, when the store staff commenced to lock the valuables up in the vault. It was then seen that 18 rings and about 75 stick pins were gone. The former were ladies' solitaire diamond rings and ranged in value from \$75 to \$650. Of the pins one alone was valued at \$150. The others were of various prices.
