FLIP-FLAP WON CLAREMONT NOSED OUT DOLLY SPANKER

Cairngorm Took the Last Race in
Fast Time—Results at Latonia
and Card for To-Day.

New York, June 1.—Flip-flap, split favorite at 11 to 5, won the Claremont Handicap at Belmont Park today, equaling the world's record of 1:13.75, held jointly by Martinmas and Mineola. Zienap set a terrific pace to the stretch, where Dolly Spanker took command. He appeared to be a winner, but Radtke on Flip-flap began to ride hard, and gradually closing on the leader, got up and won by a nose.
