HAMILTON FEARS MORE RIOTING

Mayor Will Keep Troops There Until After the Bye-Elections.

Hamilton, Dec. 3.—The action of the Street Railway Company in discharging all the non-union men on the city system and the Hamilton and Dundas line will prevent any chance of a hitch in the negotiations with the union. All the strikers, with the exception of the Radial, are back at work this morning, several more cars having beer repaired since Saturday. A non-unior crew on one of the north cars quit on Saturday night when a crowd below the bridge threatened violence, The union crew which took the car down on the next run had to display their union cards to prevent trouble.

The cars were never so well patron ized before. The conference between the union and the company officials which was to have taken place this morning at 10 o'clock, was postponed until 3 o'clock this afternoon. The company's representatives for some reason failed to appear. A schedule was partly agreed on. The whole case will probably be disposed of by the board at tomorrow morning's session. One of the questions that will have to be arbitrated is the case of the union men on the Radial. They have

not been taken back yet. The troops have not been sent away yet. Mayor Figgar says there are good reasons for holding them here, but he would not discuss the matter. It is believed that there may be trouble on the streets after the elections tomorrow night, and this is said to be one reason why the regulars have not received marching orders yet.
