

BROTHERS UNITED ON BATTLEFIELD AT CAPTURE OF RIDGE

One Transporting Prisoners
To Rear Met by Brother.

HUGHES BOYS ELATED

Come Together by Chance After
Separation of Two
Years.

Brothers reunited upon the battlefield of France after being separated for two years. The happy occasion was witnessed by the experience of Orville C. and William C. Hughes, sons of G. T. R. Hughes, Constable John Hughes, as related in a letter received by the latter today written by the elder son, Orville.

The meeting was on the afternoon of May 1st last, and was entirely accidental, as neither was aware that the other was in the neighborhood. It was just behind the front trenches at Vimy Ridge after a fierce charge by the British and Canadians, in which a number of German prisoners had been taken. Orville was one of a party detailed to remove a number of German prisoners to the rear, and while they were marching along the road met another party coming up. As they approached they exchanged greetings and cheered each other. Orville recognized his brother in the British uniform, and the reunion followed, both being allowed a short leave.

Orville enlisted with a draft from the Mechanical Corps that left Toronto in December, 1914. He was gassed at St. Etienne, France, in December, 1915, while his unit was repairing wire entanglements. Orville C., the younger brother, took a Lieutenant's course last summer, secured his commission and proceeded overseas with a special staff. Later he was attached to the 135th Battalion.

OTTAWA WANTS TO KNOW WHEREABOUTS OF MRS. MAY MAYNARD

A communication from Lieut. D. McKenna of the officers' estates department, military headquarters, Ottawa, has been received by Chief Justice Williams requesting that information be furnished, if possible, concerning the present whereabouts of Mrs. May Maynard, whose last known residence was in this city. The information, the letter states, is required by the department in order to assist in the winding up of her late husband's military estate. If Mrs. Maynard is in the city or her address known, if such information be furnished, Inspector Birrell at the police station, the same will be forwarded to the proper authorities at Ottawa.

ELEVEN FOUND FIT FOR OVERSEAS WORK

Slight improvement was noticeable in the local recruiting situation yesterday when 11 men were examined at the London mobilization centre, of whom 10 were found fit, and 3 unfit for service in the Canadian forces. Eight of the men who passed were from London, and one came from each of three towns. Godrich, St. John, and the London Men of Canadian birth led the list, with 2, 2, and 2 of English birth, while Scotland and the United States each had 1 each. The 63rd Depot Battery, got most of these who passed yesterday, leading the Canadian Engineers, 1 man, and the Army Medical Corps, 1 man, and the Railway Construction Company, 1 man. The Railway Construction Company, the 25th Regiment Overseas Company and St. Thomas each getting one man.

Two brothers, A. Powell and W. Powell, offered themselves for service yesterday, and when they had passed the medical examination, chose the Army Medical Corps as the unit they preferred to join. Their father has been overseas for some time.

INVESTIGATORS WILL MEET AT FIRE HALL

UTILITIES REFUSES TO PAY TAXES ON CITY HYDRO LAND

The Collector Contends That
\$2,300 Is Due Community.

ACT PASSED LAST YEAR

Council Likely To Force Payment After Papers Are
Consulted.

The utilities commission has refused to pay the city the sum of \$2,300 taxes on the city's assessment of the lands owned by the Hydro Commission. At the last session of the Legislature an act was passed making the lands owned by the commissions liable for taxation, where the land is situated within the city limits. The act provided that the local commission owes the city that sum of money. Copies of the act will be secured, and the collector will be given the authority of the council to collect the amount.

POSTPONE CASES SO THAT FARMERS MAY KEEP BUSY

Judge Macbeth Urged To Lay
Over Jury Actions.

DEPT. MAKES REQUEST

Counsel Expected To Comply
in Order To Facilitate
Production.

The Dominion department of justice has sent a communication to Judge Macbeth, asking that he exercise his influence in having as many as possible of the jury cases set down for trial at the June session postponed until the December sittings of the county court. The department in making the request states that in view of the fact that greater production that it is vitally important at this time of the year that the men summoned from the agricultural districts be not detained any longer.

In view of this, it is expected that a number of the twelve jury actions listed for trial at the June session will be postponed until the December sittings. It is understood that local lawyers interested in different cases have signified a willingness to urge upon their clients a postponement of the cases where possible.

100 MEN SOON WILL LEAVE FOR EAST

About 100 members of the Overseas Detachment, Canadian Engineers, will form a draft which will leave for eastern training points at the end of this week. Fifty men will be sent to the Engineers' Signal Training Depot at Ottawa, and the other fifty will go to the Engineers' Training Depot at St. John.

The Signal Training Depot of the Engineers offers wide opportunity to men desiring to serve their country overseas, and at the same time learn some trade. The men are trained in the use of the telephone, telegraph and wireless telegraph operators. Every man is made a specialist, and the opportunity for clerks, accountants and men of similar occupation is excellent.

FORESTRY COMPANY ALMOST AT STRENGTH

No. 1 Forestry Company, under command of Major Taylor, is rapidly increasing in strength, and it is expected that in a few days it will be up to full strength of a forestry company. Today the company stood at 145 men, and it will be only a short time before the 177 men required will be on the roll. Major Taylor is having all his men inducted by the M. C. officers so that every one will be ready and no delay will be occasioned when the time comes for them to depart for overseas service. EMPRESS AVE. REPORTS SHOW CHURCH TO BE IN HEALTHY CONDITION

At present he is studying the Imperial Group Hospital system in the neighborhood of London, but will soon be at Sporncliffe, where he will have his headquarters. Altogether I will have 58 Imperial group hospitals under my command. I will be sending letters to the C. S. Hospital, Kent, England.

ARRAY OF WOMEN'S WEAR

Valuable Silks From Local
Stores Decorate Court
Room.

Tearing her hair, throwing herself upon the floor in a fit of hysterical weeping and shrieking at the top of her voice that "she did not care whether they kill me or not," Accalia Derno, good-looking young married woman, pleaded guilty in police court today to three charges of theft.

Laetitia Marilio, a middle-aged woman of the same nationality, also pleaded guilty to two charges, her statements being that the shoplifting had been committed while the two were together. Both reside at 7 Dundas street.

Upon a table in front of the magistrate's bench was arrayed a miscellaneous collection of feminine wearing apparel that would have made glad the heart of any woman. In the commission of the thefts they had expended good judgment, having selected practically all silk articles.
