

The Vast Opportunities of the West Strongly Brought Before the General Assembly.

The members of the General As sembly who are specially interested in the work in home mission flekds could not have been other than gratified with the reports submitted last evening from the eastern and western sections. The session was given over entirely to the presentation of these reviews of the past year's work, and to addresses by several of the clergy. The report of the eastern section, which includes the Maritime Provinces, stated that the darkest page in the cheering retrospect is that which contained the record of the scarcity of men to supply some of the fields so much in need of additional laborers.

Workers Do Not Increase. Catechists were fewer than in previous years, and there had been little f any increasce in ordained missionaries. The latter numbered 24, an increase of three over 1904, and a decrease of ten compared with 1903. They had supplied congregations with 69 preaching stations, 3,871 of an average Sabbath attendance, 1,066 families, 148 single persons and 1,615 communicants, of whom 101 were added in the year. The 44 catechists-ten less than in 1904-supplied 54 fields with 110 preach-

ing stations, and an average attendance of 5,470. New Brunswick Situation. In New Brunswick little was accom-

plished in the winter owing to the severity of the weather. There was a need of more workers, for it was known where missions with 30 to 40 families, and one with 80, that were vacant for six and eight months. No large growth of population was experienced in any part of New Brunswick, but it was hoped that the investment of capital in manufactories would bring about a change in this respect. B., about 25 years ago, had met with considerable success for ten years; 40 or 50 new fields were organized, 60 new churches were built. The move, however, did not go on, as the population was at a standstill.

"There is hope for the future," said Dr. Ross. "This is only a branch of the industry where there is no growth or a decide improvement. The school and church must do for the people of the west what it has done for the people in the east." The resolution was then submitted
