### In the Dining-Room.

SUNDAY, JAN. 18.

**BREAKFAST**—Fried tripe. Creamed potatoes. Squash. Griddle cakes. Maple syrup. Coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Salmon croquettes. Buttered toast. Cranberry jelly. Chocolate.

**DINNER**—Scalloped mutton with macaroni. Mashed potatoes. Bread and butter. Olives. Almond blanc-mange. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

**Squash Griddle Cakes**—One cup boiling milk, one cup sifted squash, one tablespoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one egg, one small teaspoonful of baking powder and one cup of flour. Four the boiling milk into the squash; add the butter, sugar and salt. When cool add the egg, well beaten, then the baking powder mixed with the flour. Fry a delicate brown.

**Salmon Croquettes**—Drain the liquor from a small can of salmon, remove the bones and chop very fine. Bring a cup of milk to the boiling point and stir in a tablespoonful of flour rubbed smooth in two tablespoonfuls of butter. Add the chopped salmon and boil one minute. Stir in two well-beaten eggs and remove from the fire. When cold make into croquettes, dip in beaten egg, roll in bread crumbs and fry.

**Scalloped Mutton with Macaroni**—Remove the fat and skin from cold roast mutton, cut the meat into small thin slices and season with salt and pepper. Butter a shallow pudding dish, put in a layer of cracker crumbs, then a layer of meat, then one of cold boiled macaroni cut in inch pieces. Over the macaroni sprinkle a tablespoonful of tomato catsup. Proceed in this way until the dish is full, having on the top a thick layer of cracker crumbs moistened with one-third of a cup of melted butter. Bake half an hour.

**Almond Blanc-Mange**—Boil together one quart of milk, four tablespoonfuls each of cornstarch and sugar. When thick stir into it 30 blanched and split almonds and mold. Serve with cream and sugar.

Winnipeg Hockeyists Lose Again at Montreal.

### HOCKEY.

WINNIEPEG LOSES AGAIN.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—The visiting Winnipeg hockey team was badly defeated by the Victorias here last night, who scored 8 games to the visitors' 2.

HARRISTON VS. LISTOWEL.

Harrison, Ont., Jan. 15.—A friendly game of hockey was played here last evening between Listowel and Harrison, resulting in favor of the home team by 4 to 2.

PARIS VS. SIMCOE.

Paris, Ont., Jan. 15.—A championship match in the Southern Ontario Hockey Association series was played here last night between Simcoe and Paris. The home team won by 7 to 2.

CHECKERS.

DYKES IS CHAMPION.

Windsor, Jan. 15.—J. M. Dykes, of Wardsville, and Robert McLaurin, of Windsor, played checkers for the championship of Canada and a silver challenge cup in November, under the auspices of the Windsor Checker Club. The match was not finished. Dykes arrived a few minutes late at the sitting, and McLaurin, although he had a comfortable lead, claimed the match on default, and refused to play the remainder of the games. D. H. Bedford, who claimed to be the referee, awarded the match to McLaurin. Dykes made a protest, and it has been sustained at the club's meeting. McLaurin refuses to play until the dispute is settled. The match will probably be arranged between him and Campbell, of Parkhill, to be played in Windsor some day within the next two months.

\$4,100 IN PRIZES.

New York, Jan. 15.—The local chess club of Vienna, Austria, has announced that the international masters' chess tournament will be held that city during the months of June and July. There will be 16 prizes in all, to the value of 20,000 kronen—about \$4,100.

Adelaide, South Australia, Jan. 15.—The third test cricket match between the Australians and the visiting English eleven began yesterday. At the close of play the Australians had scored 310 runs for two wickets. Darling was not out for 173 runs.

BASEBALL.

EIGHT PITCHERS IN ONE CLUB.

New York, Jan. 15.—After consulting with President Ebbetts of the Brooklyn club, Manager Barnie has withdrawn the draft of Pitcher Horton, of the Syracuse club and Horton will play with the Eastern League champions the coming season, as the team of the club has a staff of eight pitchers at present.

FLYING.

Olie Beard will play with Columbus when the game opens up.

Louisville has returned Leves and Stafford to Louisville. It is said the kid's stick work is too tight for the National League, despite the fact that he batted at .325 last season.

Robinson and McGraw have just added to their gallery a number of baseball and other sporting pictures, many of them of much historic value. These pictures were taken by the late Kinslow, the oil catcher, who has given up his saloon business in Washington, with a view of going back into baseball. Kinslow thinks he stands a good chance to get an engagement with New York or Pittsburgh.

Manager Barnie has sent out contracts to the 23 men under reservation by Brooklyn.

The Cincinnati Enquirer says that the National League championship season will probably begin April 15.

WHEELS.

SPOKES.

The Denver Wheel Club has withdrawn from the L. A. W. It is the largest organization in Colorado.

Eddie Bald is now at his home in Buffalo, recuperating from his recent illness. He will train in Florida this spring.

In chase, the English cyclist, has issued a challenge to race any man who has been defeated by Michael. It is aimed particularly at Taylor, the Frenchman.

Daily and evening papers from England are deploring the lack of training English clubs, and the consequent lack of success. Walton, trainer of Chase, declares that there is one man of England, now in Australia (J. Platt-Betts), who is another Jimmy Michael for work. Betts trains all the time, and has won many races, much as does Michael. He walks, runs, boxes, skips the rope and rides twice daily at speed for a great number of miles. Like Michael he never seems to tire. Betts is scheduled to go for all records this season on English tracks, from the quarter-mile to the hour, all of which records are now held by Stokes.

Tom Eck wants the L. A. W. to limit the size of racing machines to limit and long distance races to tandems, triplets and quads. He says that quads and sextets have proved to be dangerous, and that other machines are fast enough. Other racing men say that Eck does not want to spend the money to buy the big machines, hence his desire to bar them from the track.

THE TURF.

PARMER-HENDRIE DATES.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 15.—Secretary Farmer announces the dates and stakes for the spring race meetings which will be held at Highland Park, Detroit, Fort Erie, Montreal and Windsor, Ont., under the direction of the Parmer-Hendrie syndicate. Five stakes each will be run at Detroit, Montreal and Windsor, the aggregate value being about \$25,000. The circuit will open at Detroit June 1 to 23, the principal event being the renewal of the Detroit Derby, valued at \$2,500. The four stakes at Detroit for three-year-olds, mile and a quarter, worth \$2,500. Five other stakes of \$1,000 each will be run at Montreal. Dates are July 14 to 20. The Windsor meeting is booked to open Aug. 2 and will close the 15th. Five stakes valued at \$1,000 each are hung up. These latter dates may be changed, providing the

Detroit Jockey Club gives a meeting in August.

Called Away.

Mr. John Cameron, of Strathroy, Dies Very Suddenly.

Biographical Sketch of the Well-Known and Popular Barrister.

One of the most esteemed members of the Ontario Bar Association, Mr. John Cameron, the well-known lawyer of Strathroy, died very suddenly at the Queen's Hotel in that town last night. He had been unwell, but his ailments were not considered to be of a serious nature, until he was compelled to take to his bed early yesterday. Deceased was 53 years of age, and was born in London township only a short distance from this city in 1833. His parents were among the country, and his aged mother still survives him. In 1859 he graduated at Queen's College, Kingston, and was called to the bar in the law offices of Cornish & McDonald, in this city. Having been called to the bar, he removed to Strathroy in 1872, where he had since enjoyed an extensive practice. In 1874 he was united in marriage to Miss Malone, daughter of Capt. Malone, of the Canadian Dragoons, who predeceased him. In 1887 deceased secured a certificate at the Cavalry School, Toronto, and in many years was connected with volunteer forces, and for several years was adjutant of the Twenty-third Battalion. He was widely known in London, where he spent his boyhood, and in legal circles in this city and throughout the province. He was an ardent Liberal, and worked unceasingly in the ranks. He leaves a widow and two sons, respectively 10 and 10, who attend school in London. A sister of deceased married ex-Ald. Thomas, of this city, and a brother was Mr. Alex. Cameron, formerly of this city.
