Squash Griddle Cakes-One cup boiling milk, one cup sifted squash, one tablespoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one egg, one small teaspoonful of baking powder and one cup of flour. boiling milk into the squash; add the butter, sugar and salt. When cool add the egg, well beaten, then the baking powder mixed with the flour. Fry a delicate brown.

Salmon Croquettes-Drain the liquor from a small can of salmon, remove the bones and chop very fine. Bring a cup of milk to the boiling point and stir in a tablespoonful of flour rubbed smooth in two tablespoonfuls of butter. Add the chopped salmon and boil one minute. Stir in two well-beaten eggs and remove from the fire. When cold make into croquettes, dip in beaten egg, roll in bread crumbs and fry.

Scalloped Mutton with Macaroni-Remove the fat and skin from cold roast mutton, cut the meat into small thin slices and season it with salt and pepper. Butter a shallow pudding dish, put in a layer of cracker crumbs, then a layer of meat, then one of cold boiled macaroni cut in inch pieces. Over the macaroni sprinkle a tablespoonful of tomato catsup. Proceed in this way until the dish is full, having on the top a thick layer of cracker crumbs moistened with one-third of a cup of

melted butter. Bake half an hour. Almond Blanc-Mange-Boil together one quart of milk, four tablespoonfuls each of cornstarch and sugar. thick stir into it 30 blanched and split almonds and mold. Serve with cream
