BISHOP OF CORK ORDERS HUNGER NINETEEN LIVES STRIKERS TO EAT, BUT COMMANDS ARE LOST WHEN ARE DISOBEYED BY PRISONERS SHIPS COLLIDE

Nuns Prepare Food, But Offer Is Rejected by All—Church Official Appeals to Sinn Fein Leaders To Release Men From Promises.

Cork, Ireland, Oct. 30.—Bishop Cohan of Cork visited the jail yesterday and peremptorily ordered the hunger strikers there to take food. All of them refused. Thereupon Bishop Cohan instructed the nuns attending the hunger strikers to prepare food. The nuns, having no alternative, obeyed the command and offered food to each of the prisoners, but all refused it.

Bishop Cohan now is appealing personally to the Sinn Fein leaders to release the prisoners from their hunger strike. At noon today they had completed the 80th day of their fast. Michael Burke collapsed this morning. Sean Hennessy and Thomas Donovan are reported to be very low.

MEIGHEN UPHOLDS GOVERNMENT RECORD

Premier Meets With Interruptions From Audience At Vancouver.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 30.—Canadian Premier Meighen and Hon. J. A. Calder addressed two meetings in Vancouver last night. While Mr. Meighen was delivering an address in the ballroom of the Hotel Vancouver, Mr. Calder spoke at the Allen Theatre. Both places were crowded to the doors and a great many persons were unable to gain admission. Interruptions at the meetings were frequent. The opening statement of the prime minister was greeted with applause mingled with noise.

"If some of those present persist in trying to prevent a presentation of the government's record," he said, "I must accept that as a compliment to the strength of the government. Those who do not fear the presentation of their opponents' side will readily allow it to be given."

Referring to the Canadian achievements in the war, and how Canadians had distinguished themselves on the battlefield, he said that leading newspapers which formerly opposed the former union government, not now dare to challenge its record; and declared that more had been done for the returned soldiers in Canada than in any other belligerent country.

Eulogizing the land settlement scheme established by the government, which, he said, was the best in the world, there were returned men on the land, he asserted. In conclusion, evidently referring to the interruptions, he said: "Well, we have all had a good time."

The premier's voice showed evidence of the strain he had been subjected during the day, which was the most strenuous experienced so far by the western governor, including the presentation of addresses of welcome and their public meetings.

Referring to the Grand Trunk Railway, Premier Meighen stated that as far back as 1918, the government had told the House of Commons that the railway would be acquired, and the then opposition leader, Mr. Bennett, had no objection. They had gone to parliament with no bargain closed, as the leader of the opposition had said.

"The government will resign the moment it occurs," retorted the premier, judging from recent votes, that was unlikely.

WRANGLER MAKES READY FOR DRIVE OF BOL SHEVIKI

Anti-Soviet Leader Drawing Lines Tighter.

Constantinople, Oct. 30.—Gen. Baron Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, is drawing in his lines preparatory to expelling the Russian Soviet forces, according to advices received here from the Southern Russian front.

Gen. Wrangel has given up Orskov, but is repulsing the Bolsheviks, who are attempting to cross the Dnieper at Akkhi, southeast of Kiev, and other points.

MURDERED MAN IS IDENTIFIED; FORMER CANADIAN SOLDIER

Chicago, Oct. 30.—The ragged stranger, for whom yesterday's 25 years' imprisonment was identified today as John Barrett, a Canadian soldier, was identified by Herbert Potter, also a Canadian, who said he had known Barrett well for some time prior to the murder.

He led detectives to a hotel where he said Barrett had been staying.

EFFECTS BEING MADE TO ARREST MEXICANS WHO KILLED AMERICAN

Mexico City, Oct. 30.—Every effort is being made to apprehend the criminals who held up and killed Arthur Moore and Gustavo Salazar near Toluca recently, declared a note headed by Mr. E. Hanna, acting United States charge d'affaires, at the Mexican foreign office yesterday. The note was in answer to representations made by Mr. Hanna last Wednesday, on which occasion he asked that the persons guilty of the outrage be apprehended and punished.

The foreign office note, which has been sent to Washington, said arrests were imminent.

TROOPS ARE SUMMONED

Mexico City, Oct. 30.—Military aid is being called to prevent disorders in a number of cities, notably Puebla and Vera Cruz, in connection with the general strike situation, which apparently is from settlement. The general continues in Puebla.

Concrete Steamer Sinks Rapidly After Being Struck. OTHER BOAT DAMAGED Accident Occurs Last Night in Narragansett Bay.

Newport, R. I., Oct. 30.—Members of the coastguard crew stationed here reported early today that no trace had been found of any of the 19 missing members of the crew of 34 who were on the concrete steamer Cape Fear when that vessel was sunk in Narragansett Bay last night in a collision with the Savannah Line steamer City of Atlanta.

The coastguardmen conducted an all-night search and found only quantities of wreckage that had been parts of the upper deck of the Cape Fear, which was a United States shipping board vessel. Points along the shore reported wreckage washed on to the beach, but there was no word of the missing men. Both vessels carried only their crews.

The weather was clear, with but a slight cloudiness when the accident occurred. The Cape Fear was struck amidships and sank in three minutes, about half-way between Castle Hill on the Newport shore and Rose Island, lying down bow first in 125 fathoms, the greatest depth in the bay.

The City of Atlanta's bow was damaged badly and there was a seven-foot hole above her main deck. Her bulkheads held, however, and she anchored in the bay. She struck squarely with her bow and cut a deep hole in the Cape Fear, shattering the concrete. The Cape Fear went down so quickly that the lines that had been thrown aboard immediately after the crash were of little help and the majority of the crew had to jump into the water.

SMALLER STATES TO HOLD A CONFERENCE

Questions of Interest to the Newly-Created Territories To Be Discussed.

Vienna, Oct. 30.—Plans for a "junior Brussels conference" to include states newly created as a result of the war, those receiving territorial advantages from the dismemberment of Austria, and possibly certain contiguous countries are understood to have been formulated by the Austrian state of the reparations commission. This conference would be non-political and would be intended solely to bring the new states together to discuss problems such as trade, transport, frontier restrictions, imports and export licenses on similar matters. It is believed a discussion of these affairs would be further trade relations between the countries interested and would promote commercial goodwill, better understanding and the common welfare of all.

PROJECTILE FOUND IN N. Y. STATION

New York, Oct. 30.—The projectile of a three-inch shrapnel shell attached to a six-inch copper tube of one-half inch diameter, with a burned fuse, was found in the Thirty-third street driveway of the Pennsylvania station here early today. It was carried in a pair of water to the bomb squad room at police headquarters for analysis.

The projectile would not have caused much damage had it exploded, the police said.

CANADIAN WHISKEY LABELLED "SOUP" APPEARS IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Characterized by many of the old "tipplers" as having "a distinct bearish movement in the whiskey board of trade," liquor disguised, labelled and billed as soup, coming from Canada, made its appearance here today, according to federal officials. The liquor, said by imbibers not to have the strength of "the old stuff," sold "cheap."

The discovery of a draft for \$31,000 on a Louisville bank may disclose, federal officials said today, the purchaser of the recent shipment of whiskey into Chicago, which was delivered to the saloon keeper and "customers" and almost immediately thereafter stolen from the "customers" through the connivance of men posing as city policemen.

Complaints to police and federal officers as a result of this "theft" led to the present federal court whiskey investigation.

Federal officials discovered that the \$31,000 draft was for the purchase of 1,000 cases of whiskey which corresponded to the amount of the shipments forming the chief feature of the investigation.

WILL FIGHT IF GAS IS CUT OFF BOOZE PROFIT

Belmont Case Next Week.

Belmont, Oct. 30.—Consumers of natural gas in Belmont and vicinity will fight to the bitter end to prevent the supply from being cut off to raise the price to 85 cents. At a conference in progress here today it was decided to immediately issue an injunction in case the company attempts to cut off the supply.

Commissioner Estlin is attending the conference, and also Major A. Sweet of Belmont, who is looking after the interests of the farmers dependent upon gas for their fuel supply are keenly interested in the matter and followed the arguments closely. In the absence of J. M. McEvoy of London, who is looking after the interests of the consumers, P. H. Bartlett was present.

ITALIAN PARLIAMENT TO APPROPRIATE SUM OF 20,000,000 LIRE

London, Oct. 30.—Appropriation of 20,000,000 lire to be used for the establishment of a national credit institution to finance co-operative measures and to secure a reduction in the cost of living, has been authorized by the Italian cabinet, says a Rome dispatch from the Stefani News Bureau, a semi-official organization.

SAYS SHORTAGE WOULD BE GREATER

"Instead of being short 2,500-horsepower, we would be short about 12,000 if we had relied on Judge Barron," was the reply made today by General Manager E. V. Buchanan of the Public Utilities Commission to the letter by the judge criticizing hydro management.

Mr. Buchanan contended that only the fact that hydro was developed to its present extent was keeping local factories open and local workmen busy. If the city was relying on electricity from privately-owned plants generating electricity with coal, the shortage would be far more acute.

HARDING WILL MAKE HIS FINAL APPEALS TO AMERICAN VOTERS

Republican Candidate For the Presidency On Last Lap of Campaign.

COX AT CHICAGO

Democratic Aspirant to Close Contest With Spectacular Features.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 30.—On the last lap of his campaign travels, Senator Harding conferred with Ohio Republican leaders here today, completing preparation of his last speeches before election, to be delivered tonight in Columbus.

Leaving here at noon, the Republican nominee was to make several stops at smaller cities on his way to the state capital. He planned to conserve his voice, however, for the night speech, which he will sum up his campaign and rest his plea for support.

With his speech tonight, Senator Harding will have made more than 170 addresses long and short, since he was nominated in Chicago. He has issued before election a final statement outlining once more the policies for which he stands.

COX WILL CLOSE FIGHT WITH OLD- TIME DEMONSTRATION

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Five speeches in Chicago, one in Gary, Ind., and an old-time torchlight parade, are on the schedule of Gov. Cox today for the closing of his campaign for the presidency. One of the greatest demonstrations of the campaign is planned for tonight, the torchlight parade at the Coliseum, where Gov. Cox's opponent, Senator Harding, was nominated.

The governor's first address is to women at a theatre under the auspices of the Chicago Women's Democratic Committee, at noon. At 2:30 p.m. he is to speak to a throng of steel workers at the Gary steel mill, returning quickly to Chicago for a speech at the Patton Gymnasium, Northwestern University, in Evanston.

After the address at the Coliseum come visits to auditoriums in different parts of the city and a visit to the South Shore Country Club about midnight.

Gaily-decorated and illuminated automobiles are to form the main section of the evening torchlight parade from the governor's hotel to the Coliseum.

Governor Cox made public here today a telegram to a woman supporter, in which he said he would visit to consult with both Democrat and Republican, if elected, to secure ratification of the peace treaty.

"I am anxious to see the government with other leaders regarding Irish and Jewish racial questions."

"I shall recognize the mandate for entrance into the league of nations, and shall work with the government."

Woodrow Wilson, with Billie Root, with William Howard Taft and any others who will work with me to experience a real helpful service."

"Furthermore, in the consideration of the matter of the cause of Ireland it is my purpose to consult with men who nurture the traditions and values of the Irish people."

As Bourke Cochran and Alfred Smith of New York, and David Walsh of Massachusetts, who will consult with leaders of Jewish thought in America."

CITIZENS WILL GET \$500,000

Londoners' Payment of Interest On Victory Bonds Due Monday.

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LAST OF WAR CONTRACTED STEAMERS LEAVES YARDS OF TOLEDO SHIPBUILDERS

Toledo, Oct. 30.—The steamer Santa Veronica, the last of 35 to be constructed for the government under war-time contracts, sailed from the Toledo Shipbuilding Company today.

The steamer will go direct to Salt Lake City, where it will be taken on for New York parties. It was built by the American-Cuban Steamship Company and is expected to be used in the Cuban sugar trade.

Capt. MacKenzie, who took the other two boats to the coast, was in charge of the crew, which came from New York.

The Santa Veronica, like the two that preceded it, the Santa Eulalia and the Santa Isabel, is an oil-burner, and built to deliver a cargo of 10,000 tons of oil through the locks of the Welland Canal.

It is believed that the vessel, after delivering its cargo, will go to Hamilton and take on a cargo of steel for Cuba, as did the Santa Eulalia.

IRISH SHOPS WRECKED

Thurles, County Tipperary, Ireland, Oct. 30.—Great damage was done last evening in Thurles, eight miles north of here, through acts of violence. Numerous shops were wrecked during the disturbances.

Details as to the circumstances and perpetrators were lacking this forenoon.

LIBERAL CHIEF SCORES PERSONAL TRIUMPH ON SASKATCHEWAN TRIP, ACTS AS GODFATHER TO FIRSTBORN

People of All Shades of Political Faith Greet Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King—Farmers Flock to the Wayside Depots and Cheer As Train Carrying Statesman Passes.

North Battleford, Sask., Oct. 29.—Traveling all morning through Northern Saskatchewan, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and his party were the central figures of a number of informal receptions. The farmers flocked down to the small wayside stations to greet Mr. King as his train passed through. At Hartford the reception was more elaborate in its nature, although it lasted only for a few minutes.

There was a brass band at the station, and a crowd of farmers, mostly Ruthenians, who insisted on a speech. The train was held for a few moments while Mr. King addressed the meeting. His references to treatment of Ruthenians and other citizens of alien birth by the government's election act touched a responsive chord, and the train drew out of the station to the sound of ringing cheers from the crowd.

Mr. King's trip through this province has become a personal triumph, even more marked than in Alberta. As the train traveled to this city at each small station it was boarded by farmers coming in to attend the big meeting tonight.

GODFATHER TO BABY

They are not all Liberals who join in the welcomes that are being extended. Mayor Klepper, whose affiliations are with the opposite party, presented the address of welcome.

At North Battleford citizens and all parties of all shades of political opinion pressed eagerly to meet Mr. King at the reception which was organized by the ladies of the city. The personal character of the response which is meeting him is being emphasized by an incident at Saskatoon, when Mr. and Mrs. James A. Gillespie, who own a farm 25 miles out of the city, came to ask Mr. King to act as godfather to their first baby.

Mr. and Mrs. Gillespie were both Conservatives, but with a constant reminder in the family in the person of William Mackenzie King Gillespie they might be counted on to support the Liberal party in the future in favor of the principles of Liberalism which the leader of the Liberal party is so ably expounding throughout the west.

BOLSHEVIKI ARE RETREATING OVER EXTENDED FRONT

Ukrainian Forces Administer Severe Defeat to Reds.

Constantinople, Oct. 30.—Bolshevik Russian forces which have been fighting against the Ukrainians along the Dnieper River are retreating over the entire front. It is stated in dispatches received here. Their line at present passes through the town of Zimnitska, about 140 miles southwest of Kiev.

Paris, Oct. 30.—Assertion is made by the French Government in its reply to the British note announcing Great Britain's decision to demand the right to confiscate German property in the United Kingdom, that the paragraph of the Versailles treaty which states that Germany is prepared to waive its integral part of the convention, says the Paris dispatch, is not binding, therefore, that this or any other clause of the treaty cannot be revised without a unanimous vote of the signatories of the pact.

The note, the newspaper says, couched in diplomatic language, and expresses the fact that an agreement between the nations on the subject may be reached.

WILL START POLISH LOAN

Warsaw, Oct. 30.—It has been decided by the Polish Government to open subscriptions to the long term Polish loan on December 5.

POLISH GOVERNMENT COMMANDEER ROOMS IN WARSAW HOUSES

Drastic Action Is Taken To Meet Housing Shortage.

Warsaw, Oct. 30.—All rooms in private dwellings in the city are being commandeered by the government to meet the housing situation in this city. This action was taken because of the approach of cold weather and the severe shortage of living accommodations. The government has decided to commandeer all rooms in private dwellings, regardless of the wealth or social position of the owners.

AUTO FACTORY TO LOCATE HERE

Site of Thirty-Five Acres Has Been Secured in East London.

According to information given to The Advertiser yesterday, negotiations have been completed for the purchase of 35 acres in East London on which the Stansell Motors Company, Limited, of Toronto, has secured a site for the manufacture of automobiles.

The firm's Canadian branch plant is now being built on the site. It is stated, wants much larger buildings and has interested local capital and will erect a plant employing a large number of hands.
