Umps. on His Dignity Players Must Show Respect This Year

NEW YORK, April 5.—Nine umpires, the full National League number of arbiters, were received in audience by President Lynch and Secretary Heydler in the St. James sanatorium yesterday, and rules and regulations were discussed before the opening of the pennant season. The umpires and the residential districts which they honor were as follows: Henry O'Day, sometimes known as Hank, Chicago; Jas. Johnston, Newark; Robert Emslie, St. Thomas, Canada; William Klein, Little Rock; William Brennan, St. Paul; Steven Kane, Louisville; Charles Rigler, Virginia; August Moran, Philadelphia; and De Witt Van Cleaf, Trenton.

President Lynch is strongly opposed to

protests on general principles. He thinks there have been entirely too many of these, and yesterday he pointed out to the umpires that all but two or three of the last ten years were umpires who were not umpires. Lynch told his umpires to carry a book of rules with them on the field with a view of clearing up disputed points then and there and thus avoid having them come up later thru protests.

The division of the umpire's duties was discussed, the five as to parts of the field to be covered by the umpire in chief and his assistant. The umpires were instructed to enforce rule 75 strictly. This rule deals with spectators coming on the field of play after the game has started, and under its strict enforcement photographers are not to be allowed to perch around the base line staking pictures after the battle has begun.

The sentence and plays in connection with it came in for an airing, particularly in reference to catchers stepping out of

their position to take the pitch. Umpires will call a balk in such event and the runner is allowed to score. The etiquette of the field as between players and umpires is to be observed with all due ceremoniousness and there must be no flippantness, facetiousness or undue familiarity between players and umpires. Club presidents will be asked to provide benches sufficient to all regular and substitute players, something especially needed early in the season when many players are being carried, and the umpires are to see to it that the lines restricting the coaches to bounds are plainly marked.

New York's New Betting Laws.

ALBANY, April 4.—The Agard-Perkins bill prohibiting oral bookmaking and repealing the exemption from personal responsibility which members of racing associations now enjoy under the Percy-Gray law, was advanced to the order of final passage in the assembly to-day after a vigorous effort to have them recommitted for a hearing. The attempt to recommmit the bill failed, one vote being 45 to 70, and another 55 to 74. Minority Leader Frisbie was one of the few Democrats who opposed recommittal on the final vote.

Discussing the bill, Mr. Perkins emphasized the fact that they are not designed to prohibit private wagers between individuals.
