THE WEATHER

Meteorological Office, Toronto, Nov. 8. (3 p.m.)—A storm is rapidly developing to the westward of Lake Michigan, while a pronounced cold wave has come from the northward over the western provinces, accompanied by northerly gales and snow. From Ontario eastward the weather today has been mostly fair and mild.

BURGLARS RANSACK HOME OF RESIDENTS

Articles of Value Stolen, But Sum of Money Overlooked by Thieves.

While Mr. and Mrs. Anderson and family were away from home on Sunday evening, burglars entered their residence, 974 Logan avenue, and thoroughly ransacked the premises.

Miss Ethel Anderson, who returned home before her parents, on entering her bedroom, was seized by two men who were engaged in turning out the contents of the dresser table, and springing backwards she fell into the bottom of the stairs. Altho shaken and bruised, the young woman ran into the street and called for assistance.

Returning to the house, she found her wardrobe with some neighbors, the thieves had decamped.

Several articles of value were taken, but the robbers overlooked a sum of \$50 placed in a drawer by Mrs. Anderson as a payment to be made on her home today. Miss Anderson could not give a description of the men to the police owing to the lights being turned off.

About a month ago, thieves entered the house adjoining and no arrests have been made up to the present.
