HEAVY CASUALTIES OF AMBUSH PARTY IN COUNTY CORK

Official Report Says Fire
Came From Houses Which
Were Destroyed.

GANG IS ROUNDED UP

Dublin, Jan. 5.—General headquarters today denied a report that sixteen Sinn Féiners were killed when a detachment of troops was ambushed near Kanturk, in County Cork.

An official dispatch referring to the ambush says:

"The attackers are believed to have suffered heavy casualties and no members of the crown forces were injured."

The official report says that some of the attacking party were seen to be running from houses, which were destroyed.

This is the first time, it is declared, that an ambush on a large scale has been effectively beaten.

The ambush, according to a despatch from Cork, occurred in a secluded roadway outside the village of Meelin, near Kanturk. Three military lorries, says the account, were coming from Malinow when a bomb was thrown at the leading vehicle.

The bomb missed its mark. Revolver fire was then opened on the lorries, which halted while the troops poured rifle fire into both sides of the road.

Aided by a smoke screen, continuing the account, the troops made a dash and rounded up all the attacking party, killing a number of them and capturing the remainder with all their guns, rifles and ammunition.

London, Jan. 5.—Five houses in Meelin, Ireland, were destroyed today by a military order, according to a Dublin despatch to The Central News. It was at this place that soldiers were ambushed by a large party of civilians.

Shot While Escaping.
Cork, Jan. 5.—The Rev. Brother Finn Barr, J. P., of the Holy Trinity, was shot in the course of a military raid on the Imperial Hotel here, early this morning. He was attempting to escape through a window.

Raided Collectors' Houses.
Dublin, Jan. 5.—Armed men today raided the houses of rate collectors who had obeyed the orders of the local government, by depositing their collections in a bank to their own credit instead of that of councils which have accepted the Sinn Féin policy.

Sinn Féin M.P. Arrested.
London, Jan. 5.—James J. Walsh, a Sinn Féin member of parliament for the city of Cork, who escaped from Mountjoy prison, Dublin, 18 months ago, was arrested early this morning by a despatch received here. He had avoided attempts to arrest him since gaining his liberty, either by the aid of Cork or by attending his civic duties regularly.

GERMANY FILLED HER COAL CONTRACT

France Has Surplus Enough
to Fulfill Wants for Six
Months.

Paris, Jan. 5.—France has a surplus of coal large enough to supply all her economic and domestic needs for the next six months, it was stated today by both governmental and commercial officials. Contracts with other companies in the United States for more than \$100,000,000 worth of coal have been cancelled, these authorities said, while the price of United States coal delivered at French ports has fallen from \$32 a ton to \$12.50 a ton within the last two months.

Officials of the French national coal bureau declared that the manner in which Germany has lived up to the Spa coal agreement by delivering virtually all the coal demanded came as a big surprise to the French government. In the belief that Germany would not fulfill the terms, France encouraged her importers to purchase all the coal they could, while the government itself bought heavily in the United States and England. In consequence of this there are at the present time from 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 tons of coal in France.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT IS PREPARED TO MEET THE IRISH "PRESIDENT"

Will Be Given Safe Conduct
If He Is Ready to Exclude
Separation Condition—Was
Seen in Manchester, and Is
Now Busy in Ireland Con-
ferring With Leaders of the
Sinn Féin.

London, Jan. 5.—From a seemingly authorized statement issued in London tonight, it may be inferred that should Eamonn de Valera be disposed to approach the government with a peace proposal, meeting the government's stipulations that all questions of separation be excluded, he would not be discouraged. On the contrary, under such circumstances he would be treated as satisfying the prime minister's condition as being able "to deliver the goods," in fact, and that for such purpose he could secure safe conduct.

Eamonn de Valera stayed at least two nights and three days in Manchester last week on his way to Ireland, and he is now in the Manchester Times says. He arrived in an ordinary train, undisguised, and walked through the streets to keep an appointment with the leaders of the Manchester Sinn Féiners.

The Irishman who vouchsafed this information to the correspondent added:

"If he has left Manchester, he has done so in the same way he came—as a free-born citizen of the great Irish republic."

Conferring With Leaders.
Dublin, Jan. 5.—The Associated Press correspondent today conversed with several persons who have seen and spoken with Eamonn de Valera. He is reported to be in excellent health and is extremely busy, having already held several conferences with leaders of various departments of the Sinn Féin government. It is expected he soon will address a message to the people of the United States, followed by a manifesto addressed to the Irish people.

According to these informants, Professor de Valera did not come here on a peace mission, but as a result of the conviction that a situation had arisen recently requiring his presence. They distrust the reports that he is not to be arrested, and declare that he is equally "on the run" with the other leaders. They still insist that any overture must come from the British government and that negotiations are only possible on the basis of independence and by treaty between the two governments.

ARREST THREE MEN ON THE CHARGE OF HOLDING UP GROCER

Second Charge Is Laid of Rob-
bery on Davenport
Road.

FIND LOADED REVOLVER

With the arrest last night of three men living at 45 Brock avenue, the police claim to have caught the trio who entered the grocery store of Gordon Eadie, 401 St. Clares avenue, on Tuesday night and badly mauled Mr. Eadie, but took flight and left the store without securing any cash, of which there was a considerable amount in the till.

The story of the robbery was printed exclusively in The World yesterday.

The men were arrested by Detective Silverthorne and Todd on a charge of attempted robbery. A second charge of attempted robbery was laid against them. It occurred on a street near Davenport road two weeks ago. On this occasion, as on Tuesday night, the men failed to get anything from their victim.

The men are: Frank Eldridge, aged 19, living at 45 Brock avenue, and Joe and John Smith, brothers, living at the same address. Two other roomers at the Brock avenue house were also arrested on a charge of vagrancy. They were David Goldman and George Eastman.

The arrest of the five men was the result of Detective Silverthorne's recollection of the description of Eldridge given by Mr. Eadie the detective was first sent to the home of Eldridge on Havlock street, but learned there that he had not been staying at home for some time. They secured his address, however, from his parents.
