Combine Cicanliness and Health. The work of paving the St. Lawrence Market-square with brick is about to be proceeded with. It is the intention to proceeded with. It is the intention to pave the walks with wooden planks. This will be a great mistake, as the wood will soon become saturated with the refuse from the butchers' and market gardeners' stalls. The excuse for using wood is that the brick will be too cold to stand on in the winter time. If that is the case, cleanliness and health can both be promoted and the comfort of the farmers increased by paving the whole surface with brick and laying temporary slat walks on top, where required, so that the whole surface may be regularly cleansed.

There is only one contract of any magnitude now under way in the Works Department, and the board may profitably spend some of its time in comparing dates in connection with it.
