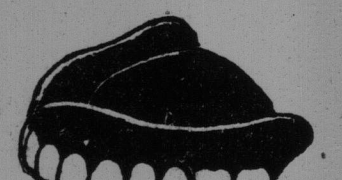

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A HOUSE BURNED IN CROUCHVILLE

Minard Foster's Large Dwelling Valued at \$1500 Was Destroyed This Morning.

Fire this morning destroyed the large dwelling house at Croucheville owned by Minard Foster and occupied by Mr. Foster and Arthur Vail. The fire started in the kitchen of Mr. Vail's premises in the upper flat and spread very quickly, completely destroying the building.

Mr. Vail, when seen this morning, said he got up about six o'clock and went to the kitchen to touch a match to the fire in the crock pot. He then ran back to his bedroom and laid in bed about 10 or 15 minutes when he again got up and on going to the kitchen he found out that a cloud of smoke as he opened the door. He immediately gave the alarm and Mrs. Vail and the children hurried out of the smoke which filled the apartments. It was found impossible to fight the flames.

As there were no facilities at hand, and after a vain attempt they fled, together with the Foster family, to the house of Mr. Croucheville, where they remained until the progress of the fire, Mr. Vail was unable to save any of his clothing and Mrs. Vail and the children likewise had to fire in their night clothes.

The house, which was valued at \$1500, was completely destroyed, but the barns and outbuildings escaped the flames.

Speaking of the origin of the fire, Mr. Vail said the only way he could account for it was that in breaking the matches apart as they lay on the shelf in the kitchen they had ignited and set fire to the muslin curtain, from which the flames quickly spread to the woodwork.

The fire means quite a heavy loss to both the families as practically everything was destroyed.

MARINE NOTES

Steamship Wyandotte sailed from Penarth last Tuesday for this port to load for South Africa.

Schr. William Marshall, ice laden, arrived at Vineyard Haven Tuesday from St. John for orders.

The tug Kingsville has changed hands, passing from the control of Capt. Wesson and Messrs. E. L. Jewett, George Molcan, J. Hutchinson, F. C. Beatty and Pearl Jordan to that of the Englewood Pulp Co.

The Hannam Society has presented gold medals to Captains Clark of the steamer Bostonian and Schau of the steamer Manaboussie, silver medals to subordinate officers of the steamer and money awards, totalling two hundred dollars, to the boat's crew of the vessels who assisted in the rescue of the crew of the steamer British King, which foundered off Sable Island, March 11.

At the end of this month the Thomson line steamer Fremont will be put on the berth at Hull to load for Montreal and Quebec and should sufficient business be forthcoming a regular service will be kept up this season.

The announcement has been made by the Canadian Pacific Steamship management that the route south of Newfoundland, instead of through the Straits of Belle Isle, will be utilized by their steamers in the St. Lawrence trade this year, as they consider that the shortness of the Belle Isle route does not compensate for the additional dangers.

MADRID, April 11.—Vice-Admiral Cervera, who commanded the Spanish fleet, which was destroyed off Santiago de Cuba, July 3, 1898, by an American fleet commanded by Rear Admiral William T. Sampson, has been appointed commander in chief of the Spanish naval station on the Bay of Betanzos.

TO CHANGE FISCAL YEAR

CHARLOTTETOWN, April 11 (Special)—The provincial government passed a resolution today to change the fiscal year to end September 30, instead of December 31st. The restriction against the running of trrolley cars on Sunday by the proposed electric company was voted down.
