THE BUSY DAYS AT CITY HALL

Aldermen and Civic Officials Are Earning Their Money These Days--Some of the Matters Engaging Their Time and Attention at Present--Many Sub-Committees Meeting.

Since the inauguration of the new council the aldermen have been kept busy. There have been five regular board meetings this week and many sub-committees have considered special matters intrusted to their care.

This morning Ald. Tilley and Superintendent Glasgow were looking around on which to erect the ferry blocks, but they did not reach any decision and will wait the receipt of the plans from the government engineer for the dredging which is to be done in connection with the new wharves, when they can have a better idea where to put the blocks.

There were present at the meeting, Ald. Bullock, Baxter, Pickett, and Mayor Sasse. H. B. Schofield, president of the board of trade, was also asked to attend.

Montreal Butter Shippers Object to Making Amount of Shipments Public. MONTREAL, May 11--(Special)--A new order at this port by which the exports are to be no more tabulated on the books of the board of trade, has brought out a protest. The order originated in an objection made last session by the butter shippers to having the shipper's name and public. Such tables are available at other large ports and the board of trade has a view to having the Ottawa system restored.

Finally it was deemed advisable to let Emilie go with the boy away with the little girl for the time being and that done, Emilie's crying subsided.

BIRTH INSURANCE CO. UNDER AN INJUNCTION.

BOSTON, May 11--Proceedings have been brought in the supreme court by the attorney general at the instance of the insurance department against the American Birth Insurance Co., seeking the appointment of a receiver to close up the affairs of the company and an injunction to restrain it from doing business. The company was organized under the laws of Massachusetts. The petition alleges that the company is an assessment insurance company; that it has failed to comply with certain provisions of the law; that it returned an incorrect statement of its affairs for the year ending December 31, 1905; that it has appointed or employed agents to act within this state without filing with the insurance commissioner the names and residences of the persons so appointed or employed. It further alleges that the funds received from benefit claims have been expended in other ways than the payment of benefits or expenses incurred in investigating cases believed to be fraudulent.

UNCLE SAM, OBJECTS TO THE CAPTURE OF FISH POACHERS

WASHINGTON, May 11--The seizure by Canadian cruisers of the fishing smacks Raymont and Parilla, of Gloucester, added another to the many vexatious cases of this kind regarding which the state department is now preparing to negotiate directly with the British government through Ambassador Durand, upon his return to this country from England. It is pointed out, however, that, from the press reports, these new cases appear to differ essentially from those of the Gloucester boats seized a month ago off the Newfoundland coast, and brought into St. John's. While it is a debatable question as to whether the Newfoundland authorities were within their rights in arresting the Gloucester fishermen, who were there under the terms of the treaty of 1818, granting them fishing privileges with British subjects in the shore waters, no such claim is made by the state department here as to the boats, nor American fishermen have the right to travel there without the consent of the authorities. It is conjectured that this case, however, may involve a cessation of the old and long disputed "fishermen's" claim, that the American fishing boats, while within an imaginary line on the headland on the Nova Scotia coast near Cape Sable, were actually more than a marine league distant from the nearest shore and so were within their rights. This is a question to be determined by the court before which the captains of the seized vessels will appear and these facts must be established before the state department before it made to make any representations in this regard.
