A good Winter Feed for Milch Cows.

MR. Editor:—Cows, restricted during their confinement to the barn, in winter, to a dry diet, almost invariably "shrink their milk."
That is esqecially apt to be the case, where very particular attention is not paid to supplying them with water, and where they are restricted to dry hay or cornstalk feed. When roots cannot be supplied, a very excellent substitute may be provided, by chasing and steaming; but to one who has a supply of potatoes, the following method will be found very commical and efficient in retaining a flow of milk:

Take a quantity of potatoes—(those which are not marketable will answer this purpose.)
