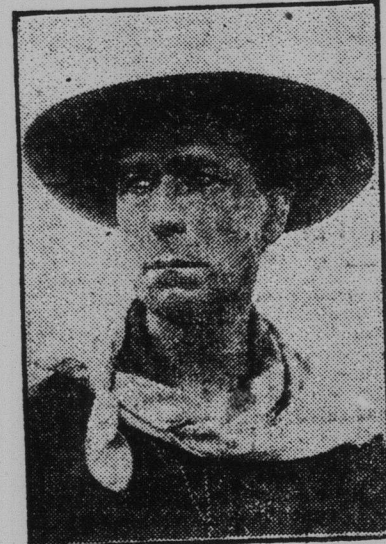

FRENCH WARN AGAINST TRICKS OF GERMANS

Paris, June 19.—An official note issued last night warned families of prisoners of war in Germany against letters purporting to come from prisoners which contain requests for parcels of food or for certain information of military character, and the latter said it contains at least twenty-five per cent. alcohol. The soldier pleaded not guilty to drunkenness. He could not identify Mr. Cameron as the seller of the bottles. The case was postponed until Friday 11 o'clock and it will be decided then whether or not this wine comes under the act.

Montreal, June 19.—It is officially stated that the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. has loaned the Imperial Munitions Board \$10,000,000 to assist in meeting financial requirements for the purchase of munitions in Canada during the next year.

RUSSIAN MONOPOLY IN SUGAR IS PROJECTED

Petrograd, via London, June 19.—The minister of finance is preparing a law creating a state sugar monopoly on the general lines of Count Witt's great vodka monopoly. Henceforth all home produced sugar will be purchased by the state at a price based on the cost of production. It will be sold at prices fixed by the ministers of supplies and finance. Retail sale will be carried on by state stores, by co-operative societies and also by private dealers, who will be paid a fixed commission. The price to the purchaser will be the wholesale price plus the trader's outlay and commission.
