out reference to the general body of a
medical opinion throughout Canada. No attempt has been made towards concerted action by the universities and medical boards.

Course Too Expensive.
Regarding the financial aspect of the question, the memo says: "At the present time the expense is almost prohibitive for the average working man's son. If another year is added it will be entirely so. A physician graduating in 1918 from Trinity Medical School in Toronto, gives his total expense, for room and board, tuition, and everything else, \$1,200. Another who graduated at Queen's in 1914, spent \$1,200 in all. These amounts included college and graduation fees and everything else, books, board, lodging, and traveling expenses."

Now the number of self-supporting
students has greatly diminished. Some figures have been secured from members of a recent class, graduating after four years at Queen's. Four students, two self-supporting and two not, who kept accurate records, supplied figures from which it has been determined that the average minimum cost of four years of the Queen's course is \$2,400. If a sixth year is added to this must now be added the expenses of the fifth year, making at least \$2,600. If a sixth year is to be required it will increase the minimum expense to \$3,000. At Toronto and McGill the college fees and living are considerably higher, and it is estimated that the cost of the five-year course cannot be less than \$3,000.

Replies to Objections.
"We arrived at our decision after long and careful consideration," said President R. A. Falconer, of Toronto University, to The Star, "and our main object is to give the students a better practical hospital training." To the objection that the new course will reduce the supply of medical men when they are most urgently needed, President Falconer points out that the supply will not be affected for seven years, as the new course only starts in 1918. So that it will be six years after the new course is introduced that the additional training as necessary. The profession demands it. Manitoba has already adopted a six-year course. Dr. C. K. Clarke said the Toronto and McGill Universities were absolutely unanimous on the question, "We contend that you cannot teach medicine properly in five years, and the opinion over most of the world is the same."
