EVELYN NESBIT THAW
AT IMPERIAL MONDAYWhitney's Operatic Dolls Will Be
the Vaudeville Novelty—A
Splendid Bill

One of the most notable film attractions presented in this city will be the appearance of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw in the five reel Lubin production "Threads of Destiny," at the Imperial Theatre Monday. 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THE JUDGESHIPS

Col. Armstrong's Appointment To
The County Court Bench Announced

Lieutenant Colonel John Russell Armstrong, Judge of probate for the city and county of St. John, has been appointed Judge of the St. John county court, succeeding Hon. J. G. Forbes, who retires. The appointment has already been forecasted in the Times and does not come as a surprise to Judge Armstrong's friends.

During his long period of service Judge Forbes has earned a reputation for honesty and fearlessness and also for his independence in dealing with cases in the manner which he considered would serve the best interests of the community, as well as those who came before him for judgment. In his case justice has been tempered with mercy, and many a man who has been unfortunate enough to stray from the straight and narrow path has been given an opportunity to return without the stigma of penitentiary service. Judge Forbes has been one of the most prominent of St. John's citizens, and has taken an active part in public affairs and given largely of his time and means for the advancement of the public welfare. He retired on account of having reached the age limit for active service in the bench, but this will leave him only freer to devote more of his time to the many public matters in which he takes so deep an interest.

The new county court judge is the son of the late Rev. William Armstrong, formerly chaplain with the British forces, and was born in 1848 at Valparaiso, where his father was stationed. He received his early education at Windsor, N. S., and studied law at Harvard. He was admitted to the bar in 1870 and
