Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within thirty miles of the homesteaded land, or on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homesteaded or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded entry (including the time required to earn homesteaded patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

FARMERS KILL BEAR WITH FENCE RAILS

With a pair of fence rails as their only weapons, Ambrose Vickers and B. Harris beat to death a savage bear near Blackville, Northumberland County, a few days ago.

The men were talking in the highway when a bear with cubs came out on the road. The animal was in a quarrelsome mood, and a stone thrown in her direction instead of causing her to run away, made her turn savagely on the men. The cub who was mounted got off his horse and the two defended themselves with stones, a well-aimed stone partially stunned the animal and before it recovered, Harris and Vickers killed her with fence rails. The cubs, however, were not seen.

The bears are very plentiful and causing much trouble this year. Owing to the failure of the berry crop the bears are robbing the camps of the lumbermen and guides.

THEY DIFFER AS TO BEST

MEANS TO RAISE MAINE

Washington, Sept. 1.—Arrangements have been made at the war department for Captain Harley B. Ferguson, a member of the board of army engineers, appointed to head the wreck of the battleship Maine from Havana Harbor, to go to Havana to superintend the investigation into the condition of the wreck. At least one member of the board does not look with favor on the O'Rourke plan for raising the battleship, which have been pressed upon the engineers and which were explained to President Taft at Beverly, this week, believing that the plans would not give the board the proper opportunity to see whether the Maine was blown up by an explosion from without or within the ship.

The O'Rourke plan provides for the raising of the Maine by placing cables under the wreck and the raising of the wreck by that means.

Leonard Boone, an employee of the steel works at Sydney, C. B., was instantly killed yesterday, when an ingot car ran over him.
