SAY DISTRESS NOW WORST SO FAR MET

Unemployment, distress and poverty during the summer and at present in St. John were more prevalent and presented a more pressing problem than had been the case in the corresponding period in any other year since the Associated Charities had functioned in the city, it was stated yesterday at the meeting of the Associated Charities in the Bible Society rooms, Germain street. W. Shivers Fisher, president, was in the chair and each member present corroborated the statement with regard to serious conditions of poverty.

While building operations in the city have brought a certain amount of employment the work has been chiefly for skilled men and has had no effect in lifting the burden off the old and the unfit. Many cases of wives receiving an entirely inadequate contribution from husbands away from the city and many cases where ill health has incapacitated the bread-winner were reported at the meeting.

In the face of these stern realities the society found that its funds had been entirely depleted and for the first time in its existence it was carrying a deficit. Means of appealing immediately to the public for support were discussed and it was felt that action must be taken without delay. The raising of a newspaper fund was a suggestion that met with the approval of the members.

Report on Summer Work.
A gift of \$23.40, being a portion of the collections taken at the Sunday services of the Ketchikan-Mona summer community, was received yesterday afternoon and came most opportunely. During the year a bequest of \$100 from the estate of Lady Barker and the receipts of the Mark Hambourg concert, had augmented the funds to some extent.

Miss Grace O. Robertson, secretary, gave the statistics of summer work as follows:
Applications received, 283; requests for employment, 29; employment was found for 22; recommended, 39; records given, 22; seeking relief, 26; relief was procured for 21; value made, \$36; clothing was given to 13; cases investigated, 14, and asking for transportation, 8.

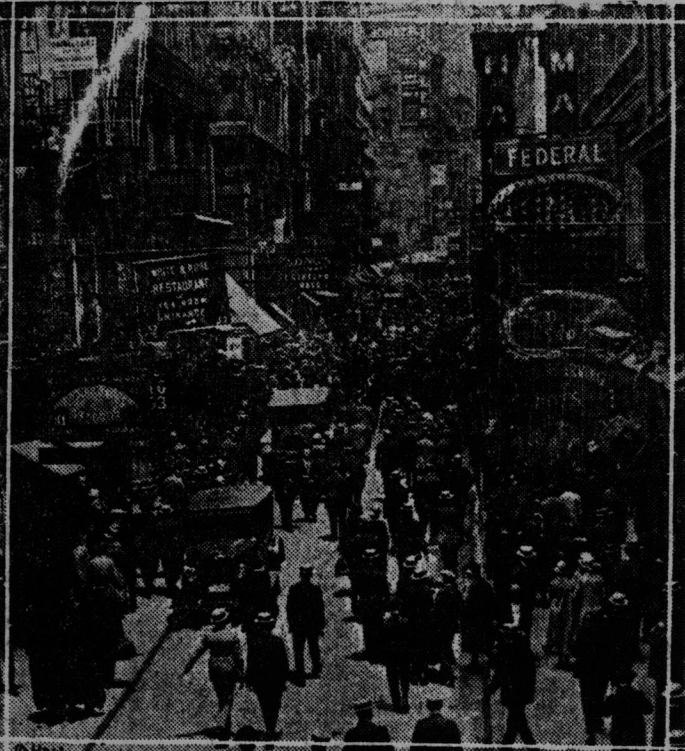
With reference to the number of those seeking relief being given as 26, it was pointed out that that was the number which could not be handed over to other organizations and was seeking relief directly from the Associated Charities. Practically all of the 283 applications received were applications for relief in some form or other and in the majority of cases the secretary was able to hand over the applicant's plea to some other society, some church or the civic authorities.

Arrangements were made for holding the annual meeting some time early in November.

THESE ADVANCES.

This was an advance of one-half cent a pound over the price paid for the last meeting of the board, a fortnight previous.

SCHOONER HELD BY CUSTOMS MEN

Chatham, Oct. 8.—The two masted schooner Anne B. M., with 100 cases of liquor aboard is being held here by local customs officers. At the time the vessel was discovered by Excise Officer Stewart and Collector of Customs Watt, she was lying in a small cove some distance below Chatham and on the opposite side of the river. The schooner's captain, Dominique LeBlanc, claimed that he had come in to report. He said that his vessel was in distress outside the day after his compass had been broken. NEW PRESIDENT OF KING'S COLLEGE

Rev. A. H. Moore, who was recently elected president of the University of King's College, Halifax, will take over his new duties this week. Rev. Mr. Moore was born in the Eastern Townships and educated at Bishop's College, Lennoxville. He has had an active and varied career. While in his undergraduate days he established "The Mirror" as a monthly magazine and it is now the official organ of the university. Fourteen years ago he went from Stanstead, where he was rector for nine years, to St. John, Que., as rector of that parish. Twelve years ago he established "The Montreal Churchman," a monthly magazine, which he has edited ever since as the official organ of the diocese of Montreal. In the recent number of that journal, the Bishop of Montreal pays a feeling and most laudatory tribute to Mr. Moore's ability, fairness and literary merit.

In addition to this, Mr. Moore has been a director of the Canadian Newspaper Association and chairman of its postal and parliamentary committee and later of its editorial committee. Last summer he toured Europe with a party of weekly editors.

In the article referred to as appearing in "The Montreal Churchman," Bishop

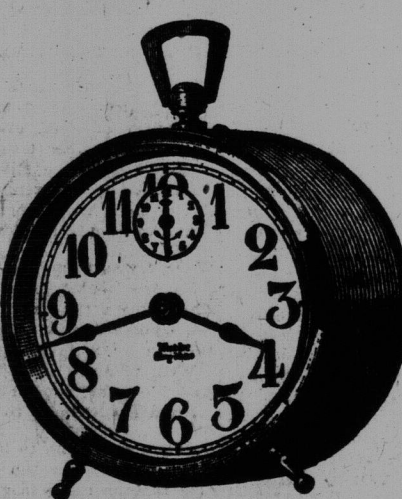

DELORME TRIAL IS FIXED FOR MONDAY.
Montreal, Oct. 8.—Adelard Delorme, whose third trial on the charge of murdering his half-brother, Raoul, was to have started today, appeared before Mr. Justice Demere in the Court of King's Bench and heard his case postponed until Monday next, owing to the number of cases now before the court.

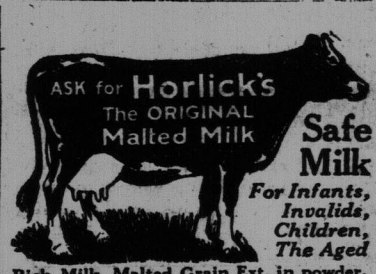

SLEEPING CAR SERVICE

HALIFAX AND ST. JOHN.

Travelers will do well to note that under C. N. R. time table effective Sept. 28th the night train Nos. 9 and 10 between Halifax and St. John are discontinued. A sleeping car for Halifax is, however, attached to train No. 20 leaving here at 6:15 p.m. for Truro. This car is picked up at Truro by train No. 8 from Sydney and carried through to Halifax, arriving at 8:45 a.m. As No. 8 does not leave Sydney on Saturday night, the sleeping car will only run from here on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Passengers should make berth reservations in advance.
A standard sleeper for St. John will leave Halifax on train No. 1 Maritime Express at 8:30 p.m. This car will be transferred at Moncton to train No. 411, leaving there at 11:30 p.m. daily except Sunday for St. John, arriving at St. John 8:50 a.m. Passengers may remain in car until 8:00 a.m. 10-12

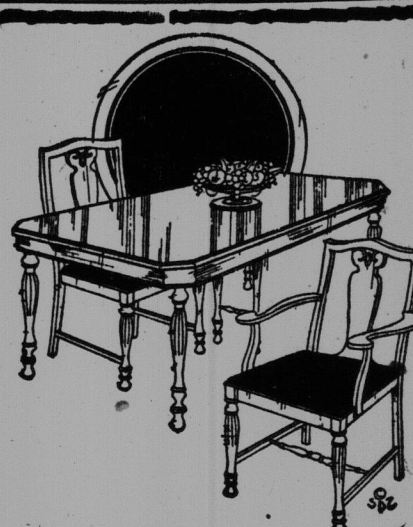
