## DR. ROBERTS HAS A MOTION WITHDRAWN AT HEALTH MEETING

(Canadian Press Despatch).  
Toronto, May 17.—In connection with the National Public Health Convention being held in this city, the national council for combatting venereal diseases presented the chairmanships of the provincial councils of the organization being occupied by government officials and also deprecated municipal health officers being chairmen of municipal branches. A resolution to this effect was proposed by Justice W. R. Riddell the chairman, but it was withdrawn upon the advice of Hon. Dr. Roberts of New Brunswick, who said that while the discussion would have a good effect, the passing of the resolution might negative this. Mrs. Richard J. Hooper, St. John, was added to the executive of the national council for combatting venereal diseases. The association discussed the question of a cure for cancer.

Dr. Adam Wright, Toronto, said he believed in the faith cure in many cases, but not for advanced cancer. In his opinion the knife was the only way to a cure in the early stages of the disease. Dr. C. K. Clarke, of Toronto, said one way to deal with the problem of mental defects was to go into the schools and treat those who required it. Dr. J. D. Page, of the federal health department, said that thousands of mentally defective ex-imperial soldiers were coming to this country.

## GERMANY HANDS OVER 150,000,000 MARKS TO ALLIES

(Canadian Press Despatch).  
Paris, May 17.—The reparations commission officially announced today that Germany had placed at its disposal 150,000,000 gold marks, partly in gold and partly in foreign currency. It was added that the reparations commission was making arrangement to accept delivery of the payment. The reparations committee in its reply to the German government accepting the payment of 150,000,000 gold marks, makes it clear that this amount will be received only on account of the one billion marks due May 31, which must be forthcoming before that date in gold or approved foreign currency, bills or drafts on the German treasury, endorsed by approved German banks and payable in pounds sterling at London, francs at Paris or dollars at New York.

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## ASK STEEL PROBE

Sydney, N. S., May 17.—As a result of the proposal of the Dominion Iron & Steel Company to make a ten per cent wage cut as a means of obtaining rail contracts, the Sydney steel workers will ask for a federal investigation into the steel industry of Canada, similar to that which is now being conducted in the coal industry. Decision to accept or reject the proposed wage cut will be finally reached at a mass meeting on Wednesday night.
