FEARS GRAIN WILL GO TO PORTLAND, ME.

Halifax Echo.—At a general meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon, President Handfield Whitman made a brief address, reviewing some of the work which had been done by the Council of the Board during the past quarter year. He touched on a number of important matters, among them the effort which has been made by delegations of the Board at Ottawa to have the essential grain elevator erected in connection with the Halifax Ocean Terminal. There had not been "much practical result" of the delegates' endeavors, said Mr. Whitman. He mentioned that the position of the city with respect to the matter was dangerous. It seemed to be the opinion in Montreal that Halifax would not get the necessary elevator, but that the Portland terminal would rather be used for grain export.

MUST HAVE ARMY DOWN TO 100,000 MEN

Paris, June 21.—The council of ambassadors decided on Saturday that the German army must be reduced to 100,000 men by July 19.

Attacking Along Front of 1,200 Kilometers.

Warsaw, June 21.—The Bolsheviks are reported to have assembled fifty divisions for the mid-summer drive against Poland, which military observers consider to be now in full swing. The Reds attacking at various points along a 1,200 kilometer front.

Germans Reported Sending War Materials—Bolshevik Say They Have Driven Poles Across the Dnieper River.

London, June 21.—The Bolsheviks, in a communication issued on Sunday, claimed to have flung the Poles across the Dnieper river to the east of Reshita and to be driving them back towards Kerenst and Orzech and in the direction of Proskur, (southeast of Lemberg).

Along the left bank of the Dnieper, the Bolsheviks say they have broken the enemy's resistance and are advancing toward Kameta (Podolsky, west of Mahlev).

London, June 21.—Moscow wireless message received here alleges that a secret alliance against Greece has been concluded between Serbia and Bulgaria.

TWO CONCRETE CHURCHES.

Two concrete churches, the first of their kind in the St. John diocese, are being erected at Newton and Annapolis, Kings county, under the direction of the Rev. J. McDermott, Sussex, and Rev. R. B. Fraser, Cursate at Sussex. The church at Annapolis is now under course of construction and is assuming proportions, while the Newton edifice is to be begun soon. These churches are of concrete blocks with concrete foundation.

A complete line of pharmaceuticals, biologicals and chemicals will be stocked, as well as every sickroom need; everything necessary for an individual's care, including more than 100 bottles, such as cotton rubber gloves, gauze, tape, invalid cushions, maternity pads, antiseptics, catgut, etc.

No stamps, cigars, kodaks, talcum powder, rouge or other accessories commonly handled by the ordinary drug establishment will be sold by Helms. Nor will there be a soda fountain in his store. Helms will not sell patent medicines, but will advise his customers to consult their physicians.
