NO LOW GOWNS AT ST. JAMES' COURT

Dressmakers, Too, Decried It Must Go—Popularity Even Wanes in Paris.

London, March 31.—The court of St. James has put a ban on the low-cut corsege and it is doomed in London. Indeed, reports received here from Paris, where it originated, say that the popularity of the ladies' low in front and lower in the back, is waning even there. It will not be long, London fashion makers say, before such gowns will be seen only in museums.

New dresses seen in London are showing more decency than ever before, and even for day wear the throat is less open than was the style last year. The new waistcoat is a fairly affair, higher than for many seasons and closing at the throat with a ruffle or a fall of lace.

Fashionable London dressmakers who go to Paris for inspiration are setting themselves squarely against the low-cut gowns. They are emphasizing necklines when one of these dressmakers saw a gown in a Rue de la Paix establishment which she liked.

"I must ask you to put a bodice on it," she told the saleswoman, who magnificently consented to put some more material in the "wonderful creation" the dressmaker was displaying.

The fact that the bodiceless gown is not approved at the court of St. James is enough to cause English women to refuse to accept it.

EACH THOUGHT OTHER A BURGLAR

Policeman Shot While Looking for Supposed Trespasser.

Newton, April 16.—Patrolman John P. Murphy of the Newton police is in the Newton Hospital suffering from a bullet wound as a result of a bit of quick gunplay which occurred in Newton Centre. A. L. Harwood of Newton Centre, shot the policeman while they both were looking for a supposed trespasser or burglar about Harwood's home.

Harwood had gone to visit Loton D. Jennings, 71 Hancock avenue, earlier in the evening. A neighbor called up to tell Harwood that some one was prowling around his house. The police were immediately informed and sent Patrolman Murphy to investigate.

Before Murphy arrived Harwood, with a friend, went looking for the intruder, armed with a revolver. As he turned a corner of the house he was sharply ordered to throw up his hands. Instead of obeying he fired at the man, whom he could barely see in the darkness. The supposed prowler returned the shot, but missed, and then fell to the ground.

When Harwood, with his companion, ran up to him, they found it was Patrolman Murphy. The bullet had struck him on the revolver hand as he held it extended, had followed down his arm and lodged in his shoulder. The police ambulance was called. Murphy was taken to the hospital, where it was said that his wound was not dangerous.

Harwood would not say who sent him the telephone message, nor the name of the friend who accompanied him on his hunt. Patrolman Murphy is unmarried and lives in Newton Upper Falls and been on the force several years.

Plans have been formulated by which every American cemetery in the country will be visited by American Legion post delegations. Wreaths and flags will be placed on the graves and memorial services conducted.

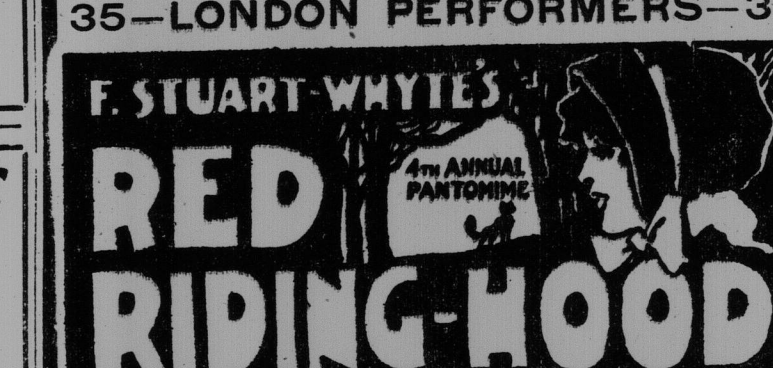
