London, Eng., Dec. 12.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Wardle, replying to Sir J. Norton Griffiths, said he thought it would now be possible to modify the restrictions on horse racing, so as to allow a limited amount of horse racing. The removal of the restrictions will be effected gradually.
Instructions have been issued by the authorities that race courses at present in military occupation are to be evacuated as soon as possible. Aintree, Manchester, Gatwick, Windsor and Lingfield are already available. Racing will probably be resumed next month.
