## PETITIONS BEING LARGELY SIGNED

Organization in Connection With Recall of Mayor McLellan Complete and Making Good Headway.

The organization in connection with the recall of Mayor McLellan is now complete and returns already are coming in that speak significantly of the feeling of the people concerning the upholding of their just claims to cheap power and the full benefit from the Musquash development.

"There can be no mistake as to the temper of the people in this matter," said a prominent worker, "and the only trouble we find is in reaching all those who are anxious to sign."

Several sheets, each bearing nearly one hundred names, have been turned in, and with from thirty-five to forty workers on the job daily, it is expected that the work will be completed by the latter part of this week. There will be no let up from now on, according to those in charge.

An announcement regarding the majority candidate is expected soon. There is a very strong feeling among all classes of citizens that this fight must be carried to a finish, and there is gratification over the manner in which opposition to the Bodell offer developed.

Nowhere is there doubt as to the wisdom of the city standing solidly for all its rights and privileges with respect to the Musquash current, and practically all who are approached declare that as the company has made its offer, which has been fully turned down, the city must get on with its business of contracting for the Musquash power and distributing over its own system at cost.

Paris, Aug. 21.—(Canadian Press.)—A French mission of three members is leaving today for Canada to open the new French art museum in Montreal. They are taking gifts to the museum from the French government, the ministry of education and the city of Paris authorities.

The mission will tour the Canadian provinces, going as far as the Pacific coast, with the object of drawing closer the ties of Canada and France.

Buffalo, Aug. 21.—The strike of the longshoremen on the Buffalo docks was declared off Saturday by O. J. Cavanaugh, acting for the International Union. The men have been idle three months, demanding ten cents an hour increase of pay.

London, Aug. 21.—The News of the World, Lord Riddell's paper, estimates that Lord Northcliffe left a fortune of probably four million pounds. On that basis the death duties on the estate will amount to about \$1,750,000.

It is understood that even members of the family had no knowledge at the time of Lord Northcliffe's death of the dispositions made in the will.

## LORD NORTHCLIFFE LEFT \$4,000,000

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Duluth, Minn., Aug. 21.—Reports from Fairbanks, Rolins, Markham and Wales, on the east side of the Kelsey fire zone, say that a heavy shower, which fell early Saturday and gave the guards needed assistance in holding back the flames. The men on the side of the Kelsey fire is said to be over at least temporarily. Guards from the east side of the burning area will be shifted to the west and south sectors, where there was little or no rainfall.
