ULTIMATUM TO-DAY
Turkey Will Receive Demands of Balkan States.
TO HEM IN THE FIGHTING
The Powers Will Take Good Care, Says German Foreign Minister, to Confine Hostilities to the Balkans and Prevent a Widespread War—Turkey Issues Orders to Mobilize Its Whole Army.

London, Oct. 3.—No ultimatum has yet been delivered to Turkey from the four great Balkan states, but, according to the most reliable news, such an ultimatum will be presented at Constantinople to-day. It will demand autonomy for Macedonia, Albania, Old Serbia and Crete within three days. In the event of failure to comply with this demand, the Balkan coalition will repeat its request, and at the same time address a collective note to the great powers, notifying them that after the expiration of another three days the Balkan states will enforce the demand by recourse to arms.

This there will be a respite of a week before hostilities open. This respite will be utilized by the powers to seek to arrange a compromise with Turkey acceptable to the four states which, it is believed, will prefer a way out without bloodshed. The Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, Count von Berchtold, had a conference of more than an hour with King George at Vienna yesterday.

No further news has been received of the reported frontier conflicts, but tension continues extreme, especially owing to the seizure by the Turkish authorities of Greek vessels.

"If the Balkan states have in view some idea of autonomy for Macedonia, they can be informed immediately that this is out of the question," was the reply of a representative of the Turkish embassy to an enquiry as to what Turkey was willing to do to appease those who are threatening her with war.

The official pointed out that Turkey had decided to apply to the whole of European Turkey the reforms already introduced, in Albania, The Porte, he said, realized that reforms were needed, but their application could not be carried out in a minute. Unless the Balkan states, he continued, were merely seeking a pretext for trouble, their only course was to allow reasonable time for the reforms to go into effect.

Turkey, he said, sincerely desired peace and had given evidence of this when the Adriatic maneuvers were countermanded. She could not, however, remain inactive while neighbors were mobilizing their armies on her borders.

To Localize Hostilities.
Berlin, Oct. 3.—A pessimistic semi-official statement, intimating that war is highly probable, is published in yesterday's Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. The hope is expressed, however, that the great powers will be able to prevent a general conflagration.

The statement, which speaks with a plainness found only in semi-official pronouncements of the most serious kind, is in part:

"The alleged or actual measures of Turkish mobilization have given the Balkan states a reason or excuse for mobilizing their forces. It cannot be determined with certainty whether their action is a counter-move to the Turkish preparations or whether it indicates serious belligerent intentions. The measures taken by the Balkan states, however, have undoubtedly increased the possibility of a collision between them and Turkey."

"With firm will on the part of all the powers to prevent an extension of the conflict, they must ultimately arrive at an understanding on the subject. If, therefore, the immediate possibility of a collision in the Balkans cannot be disregarded, it may confidently be expected that a conflagration of wider extent, into which the European great powers might be drawn, will be avoided."

The German Foreign Minister, Alfred von Kiderlen-Waechter, in an interview on the situation in the Balkans, made public yesterday, said:

"The situation is so precarious from a military point of view that hostilities may break out at any moment. The great powers, however, are united in their determination not to permit any change in the territorial position. It is hoped that the certainty of gaining only glory and no acquisition of territory if they are successful may at the last moment exert a pacifying effect on the Balkan states."

Turkey Orders Mobilization.
Constantinople, Oct. 3.—Orders were issued by the Turkish War Minister yesterday morning for a general mobilization of all the forces in both European and Asiatic Turkey.

The Turkish press is absolutely unanimous in support of the Government. The newspapers urge the Ministers to face the foreign foes threatening the empire, and also urge the

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to be intimidated by the bobs confronting the country. They declare that the Turkish army would be glad of an opportunity to avenge those who fell at the Shipka Pass in the Russo-Turkish war of 1877-78.

The Tanin says: "Hurrah for war. If the Bulgarian war does not subside by itself, Turkish bayonets will cool it."

Calling Out Reservists.
New York, Oct. 3.—A cable message calling upon Bulgarians and Macedonians in this country to return home, was posted yesterday at the headquarters of the "Macedonian-Bulgarian organization" on Morris street. The message was signed by the president of the central committee of Sofia and read as follows: "Send all Bulgarians and Macedonians to Bulgaria."

There are only about 3,000 Bulgarians and Macedonians in New York, but it is said that there are large colonies of these nationalities in St. Louis, Chicago, Pittsburg and other industrial centres. Many of these are in the first or second reserve, having served time in the army.

Good For Italy.
Rome, Oct. 3.—The Balkan crisis will hasten peace, according to the prevalent opinion in Italian diplomatic circles. This is regarded as the only way in which Turkey can claim a free hand on the sea to permit the transport of her troops from Asiatic Turkey. The great fleet of Italy being thus removed as a factor, the Ottoman navy will be free to subjugate the Grecian fleet, which is inferior.

All the Italian houses fell sharply in consequence of the Balkan crisis.

RUMOR PREMATURE
Sanction of C.P.R. "Molson" is Denied at Ottawa.
SHAUGHNESSY EXPLAINS IT
President of C.P.R. Declares That His Address in Moving the Ratification of the Proposed Stock Issue Was Not Intended to Convey the Idea That the Cabinet Had Ratified Increase of Capitalization.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—Notwithstanding any intimation which may have been made by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy at the annual meeting of the C.P.R. shareholders yesterday, it can be stated definitely that the Government has not officially sanctioned the increase in the capitalization of that company. In fact, the question has never been considered by the Cabinet.

There seemed to be considerable doubt here as to just what Sir Thomas Shaughnessy meant when in the course of his address he said: "Instead of going to the market with any considerable portion of this amount, your directors recommend that you make use of the authority conferred upon you by the Parliament of Canada to issue ordinary shares of capital stock in lieu of consolidated debenture stock. For the purpose for which you are authorized to issue consolidated debenture stock, and to that end that you increase the ordinary share capital from \$200,000,000 to \$250,000,000 to be offered to the shareholders at the price of \$175 for each share of \$100, being at a premium of 75 per cent, at a time and on terms of payment to be fixed by your directors."

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy was in the capital last week and saw a number of the Ministers, and it is felt that, while no official authorization will be issued for some days, the C.P.R. president has, nevertheless, received some intimation that the issue would be sanctioned. The general opinion here is that nothing should be done about the matter until the western freight case, which comes up before the Railway Commission on Oct. 8, is heard. Should it be proven to the satisfaction of the board, Government and public that the C.P.R. freight and passenger rates in the west are not extortionate, then it would be time to think about granting an increase. It was pretty generally understood that the western wing of the Cabinet was not in sympathy with the proposition. In fact, it has been hinted that nothing in any case would be done until after the Macdonald election, where it was held that any intimation of the Government's intention to grant the increase would not help the Conservative candidate.

It is further pointed out here as an argument in favor of the question being submitted to Parliament, that, if the increase is sanctioned by an order-in-council, the company's proposal cannot be in any way amended or modified, while if sent to Parliament and openly discussed by the representatives of the people, it could be discussed, modified, restricted and improved in the interests of the people, while an order-in-council would have to accept the C.P.R.'s proposal holus bolus. An act of Parliament could restrict and amend.

Didn't Mean That at All.
Montreal, Oct. 3.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, in announcing the forthcoming issue of \$50,000,000 Canadian Pacific Railway stock at \$175 per share in the ratio of three shares of new stock to ten of those now held, did not expressly intimate that the Ottawa Government had already sanctioned the proposal and later denied that he had intended to convey that intimation.

At \$175 per share the company would receive \$165,000,000, and at a market valuation of \$275 per share the shareholders would be made a present of \$50,000,000.

At the annual meeting of the shareholders yesterday the report of the directors was unanimously adopted. Wilnot D. Mathews, Sir Sandford Fleming, Adam R. Croelman and Sir William Whyte were re-elected directors.

A resolution was passed authorizing the construction and lease of lines mentioned in the annual report, and the purchase of the Cape de Madeleine Railway. The proposed issue of \$50,000,000 new stock at \$175 per share which forms the basis of the much-discussed application to the Government was ratified by the shareholders, and it was Shaughnessy's remarks in moving the report which gave rise to the understanding that the Cabinet had sanctioned the issue.

RACED WITH AUTO HURLED OVER FENCE
Albert Edwards was Found an Hour After Accident Occurred—Was Hurried to Doctor's Office But Injuries Were Slight

His buggy struck by an automobile about seven o'clock last night, Albert Edwards of Folsom's Corner, was thrown over a fence at the south side of the road, near the corporation line, Charles street east, where he was found an hour later. Edwards had been racing on Charles street east with an automobile, and another automobile struck his buggy. The horse, released from the buggy and although several persons were soon at the scene of the accident they were mystified at not being able to find Edwards. Later his trousers led to his discovery. He was at once removed to a doctor's office where an examination showed that his injuries were not serious.
