I talked to both Jerry and his wife on the telephone, and they are very independent over the report that he is in a sanatorium. Terry is getting ready for a busy campaign next fall and is in fine condition. Life in the Berkshire hills just suits him. I wonder why the sensation mongers can't let him alone when he has settled down."

CANADA'S FINANCIAL RETURNS OF FOREIGN TRADE ENCOURAGING

Increase of Over Eighty-One Millions Over Previous Year—Detailed Statement Shows Big Increase in Every Department—Trade by Decades.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 23.—Canada's foreign trade for the financial year that ended June 30 last amounted to \$525,000,000, which is an increase of over \$100,000,000 over the previous year. This is far and away the best showing in the country's history, and a striking evidence of the unexampled prosperity that prevails in practically every branch of trade. The imports for consumption of \$250,342,408 represented an increase of \$25,440,974 over the record of the preceding twelve months. The exports of domestic produce amounted to \$225,453,598, an increase of \$44,425,010. The exports of foreign produce totaled \$121,102,674, an increase of \$8,600,748.

The following statement shows the remarkable growth of the foreign trade of the Dominion within the last few years. By decades the trade has been as follows:

TO BUY LONDON DOCKS

And Put Them Under Single Control for Better Service.

Present Divided Management Responsible for Failure to Keep Port Facilities Up to Date.

LONDON, July 23.—Shipping interests have been encouraged to hope that something definite is at last about to be done to settle the difficult problem of the port of London. Nominally the first port in the world, it is notorious behind many others of Great Britain and indeed has been dubbed by irritated sufferers as the first and worst of its kind in the world.

Repeated futile endeavors have been made to place the port in control of a single authority with a view of reforming conditions. A committee of ship owners, dock directors and merchants which has been sitting to devise a new unification scheme has at length agreed to recommend the appointment of a controlling body in the form of a trust similar to the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, which would acquire all the docks, deepen the channels and generally modernize the port and the methods now in use. The board would represent mainly the ship owners and merchants who pay harbor dues, the various dock companies being represented on it only until arrangements for transferring their property to the board could be completed.

Details of the scheme have not been elaborated, but it will be submitted to the House of Commons at the next session. The price to be paid for the docks is not dealt with, but it must in any case be enormous, as the capital of the existing dock companies is between 15,000,000 and 20,000,000 pounds sterling.

The Government adopts the scheme the trouble will in no wise be over. It will inevitably be opposed, especially by the county council members, who are ambitious to control the port themselves, and in one of their past unreal plans proposed to allocate £2,500,000 from the rates for deepening the channels. The various bodies now having a finger in the control pie have been figured at a total of fifty-four. There are, however, actually only six effective authorities, but this is quite enough to produce a conflict.

The prime object of the new scheme is to centralize control and harmonize divergent interests.
