Police Discredit Husband's Story That

Burglars Were Responsible for the Crime.

WOMAN THE VICTIM

CHICAGO, June 1-A murder, which the police declare, promises to develop into one of the most sensational crimes into one of the most sensational crimes ever committed in North Shore suburbs, was discovered today when detectives entered the home of Dr. Haldane Clemenson, 4188 Wayne Avenue. On entering the luxuriously furnished dwelling the body of Mrs. Norah Jane Clemenson, the daughter of the late John Morgan, a wealthy capitalist of South Haven, Mich., was found lying uon her bed with a cone of medicated gauze from which chloroform fumes could be detected, lying across her face. The body was cold and stiff, showing that the woman had been dead for several hours.

Lying upon the couch in another room was the body of Dr. Clemenson. The physician was alive, and Dr. Paul Hullhorst was attempting to resuscitate him. Dr. Clemenson was apparently not overcome by the anaesthetic, and according to the physicians was simply in a hysterical condition. The house was in disorder.
