The Centennial playground will be closed for the season on Friday. On that afternoon a special programme will be arranged. The public are invited to these exercises.

The opening of the city schools will take place a week from Thursday. Dr. Bridgwood has engaged Miss Harrigan as the teacher for the Partridge Island school under the conditions imposed by the board. The school there will, it is expected, be ready to open when the city schools resume their classes.

Judgment was to have been given today in the appeal of the International Railway Co. against the decision rendered by the commission which was appointed to deal with their claims against the N. B. Railway Company. Owing to the absence of Judge Barry from the city the decision will not be announced until Saturday.

Four hundred and fifty passengers arrived on the Calvin Austin this morning. The steamer docked at 10 o'clock. Officials are well pleased with the travel this season and consider today's total a good one for the time of year. The autumn excursion season began on the 23rd inst, and at the low fare of \$6 return, record crowds are anticipated.

GUM DRYING PLANT

WILL MOVE TO TORONTO

Branch Business at Reeds Point is to be Closed Up Owing to Change in the Policy of the Concern.

St. John is about to lose an industry which has been carried on for the past nine or ten years. The branch of the Adams Company here, which has carried on the drying of gum chicla will be removed to Toronto.

The manager of the concern, C. S. Stevens, has been with the company since the inception of the business here. The plant is in the Robinson building at Reeds Point. Mr. Stevens regrets that the decision arrived at by the manager of the concern, who are all wealthy capitalists in the United States, necessitates the removal of the business to another field. Gum chicla has been brought here in its crude state from Mexico. After completing the drying process, the chicla is sent to Portland, Me., where it is manufactured into chewing gum. The closing of the branch here will bring to an end the collection of interests. Mr. Stevens is at the present time engaged in disposing of the plant. It is not definitely known when he will leave the city, but he expects to go about the last of September.

A TOURIST PARTY

A party of thirty tourists, chiefly Bostonians and New Yorkers are registered at the Victoria Hotel, arriving this morning on the Calvin Austin. R. M. Nutter, of the Beekman Touring Co., Boston, is in charge and the tour will include points of interest in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

They leave for Fredericton tonight, returning by boat tomorrow. On Thursday morning they cross to Digby and continue to Wolfville and Halifax, returning via the Halifax and South coast to Yarmouth, thence to Boston.

RECORD PRICES FOR SALMON THIS YEAR

Catch Was Poor, But Returns Are Good

Charlie Harkins Is Again High Liner, But Some Think Wm. J. Wilson Should be Given the Credit.

The salmon fishing season closed on Saturday last and again Charlie Harkins, of Dipper Harbor, ranks as high liner. He had almost three hundred fish to his credit, but the other fishermen think this is not such a record after all since Harkins fishes seven days in the week while the others lay off on Sundays. These others claim that as a matter of fact William J. Wilson, of Lorneville, should be high liner, for with six days a week he turned in two hundred and forty salmon, and received for his catch \$409.65. This is pretty good pay, so the men think, for five and a half months, when it is remembered that the expenses include only the wages of a boy and the upkeep of boat and gear.

As a matter of fact prices this year have beaten all previous records. The season in so far as the actual fishing was concerned was away below the average, not more than two-thirds the usual number of salmon being caught. But prices jumped and the returns to the men have been so high as to make the season a very successful one. The value of the hatches now in operation is apparent to all fishermen and dealers, for while past years' record seasons wherein practically no fish were taken, there has never been a failure since the hatcheries began to set in their work. No one can fathom the salmon's mind, nor tell why the fish desert some waters when the net strikes them. Explanations for poor seasons are impossible, and the whole fishing business, this branch of it anyway, is a gamble.

The St. John wholesalers received fifteen cents per pound as their lowest price for the season's just ended, while other shipments were as high as twenty cents. At this rate salmon threatens to become as great a luxury to the St. John consumer as it was to the St. John wholesaler.

Exports to New York, Massachusetts and adjoining states have fallen off, but what is regarded as the local market—New Brunswick and Maine—has developed. The shipments from St. John this year were for the most part to this local market, and the prices were the best ever known.

YESTERDAY ONE OF THE HOTTEST YET

Temperature Stood at 82 at 5 p. m.— Excessive Humidity and Lack of Wind Added to City's Discomfort.

Yesterday was one of the hottest days we have had this summer. The official thermometer touched 82 and with the excessive humidity and the lack of a refreshing breeze the day was rather uncomfortably hot.

The temperatures taken at the observatory during the day were as follows:

Highest temperature recorded during the day	82 degrees at five o'clock in the evening.

The humidity registered 82 degrees which is very high and has only been equalled once before during this summer.

At nine o'clock this morning the thermometer stood at 68 degrees giving promise of another very hot day.
