AT FREDERICTON.

The College year of the U. N. B. was brought to a close on Thursday when the largest class in the history of the college received degrees.

This marked the fiftieth anniversary of the institution under its present name. A feature of the epochal proceedings was the conferring of the honorary degree of L. L. D. upon W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, and H. V. B. Bridges, Principal of the Provincial Normal School. Both have taken a prominent part in the educational affairs of the province during the past years, and Mr. Carter is ex-officio president of the University senate. He was also president of the Alumni Society of the University last year, while Mr. Bridges is secretary of the Alumni, to which position he was re-elected to serve his fourteenth year.

The two honorary degrees were conferred upon the recommendation of the alumni, which was confirmed at a meeting of the senate.

Dr. S. W. Hyde of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., delivered the alumni oration. The order of graduation is as follows: Degree of Bachelor of Arts, with honours, Frances L. AT ACADIA.

On Wednesday last the most successful year in the history of Acadia College came to a close. Incidentally Acadia has captured the three intercollegiate trophies, viz. the King-Richardson football trophy, the Summer Hockey trophy and the trophy in Field and Track sports. She has also proved her strength in the forum by winning from King's college in debate. The graduating class number thirty-six, the second largest in the history of the college. Six received the degree of master of arts, and seven received honorary degrees. The advent of Dr. Curran, and the gift of N. Dr. Cattan's address to the graduating class was heard with close attention and was equally admirable in substance and delivery. Then came a most important announcement received with applause prolonged for fully three minutes. It was to the effect that N. Curry, of Montreal, president of the Canadian Car Company, has presented Acadia the handsome gift of \$25,000 for the endowment of a chair of engineering, to be named after his son and to be known as the Ivan Curry chair of engineering.
