Fredericton, Sept. 24.—Further evidence of most nefarious and corrupt election practices being brought into use in the desperate efforts which were made to elect Col. H. H. McLean in Sunbury and Queens, are being brought to light, and it is practically certain that the colonel will never again sit in Parliament as a representative of that constituency.

The Disappearing Ballots.

When the poll opened and the ballots were counted, in the presence of scrutineers representing both parties, it was found that two ballots were missing. From the statements made by Returning Officer Dykeman and Sheriff Holden, it is clear that the missing ballots were removed from the box between the time they were left at Mr. Steeves' house and the opening of the poll, and it is known that C. Herbert McLean, the colonel's brother, who stood at the table all day on election day, and other prominent workers in Colonel McLean's interests, visited Mr. Steeves' residence during that period.

Fake Investment Office Raided in New York—Clergyman Captured—Firm Squeezed Credulous out of Thousands


