PARLIAMENT. Budget Debate Was Continued Tuesday. DR. RUSSELL'S STORIES. The Nova Scotian Spoke in Sarcastic Vein--Hard Words About Government Immigration Policy--Roche Says We Get Off--Scourings of Europe.

States. American lumber at present successfully competes with Canadian lumber in Manitoba and the Territories. The purpose of Mr. Bennett's resolution is the giving of the British Columbia and New Ontario lumbermen a chance to get this market. The support of the resolution therefore came chiefly from Ontario and British Columbia members while the opposition came from the Northwest members.

Mr. Davis (Saskatchewan) said that to adopt the resolution would not only be against the interests of the province of Manitoba and the Northwest but the dominion at large. It was only the province of British Columbia that wanted a duty imposed. A circular distributed by B. C. lumbermen said that it was the only industry that was not protected. Binder twine and barb wire had no protection. To place a tax on lumber used in frame buildings in Manitoba and the Northwest would be injurious to the best interests of the country, and it was not in Manitoba alone that this tax would be felt.

Mr. Charlton supported the resolution and said that the Ontario saw log law had compelled the large American saw mills to remove to Ontario and that the owners of these mills felt that, as an account of their removal, they had to pay duty when they sent their lumber into the United States. They were entitled to the local Canadian market. However, there was a plethora of the cheap grades of lumber in the United States and this was dumped into Canada at less cost than the American taking their profit on the higher grades. The Canadian lumbermen could hardly dispose of their high grades of lumber abroad, but to have a market for their coarse grades at home. This market was taken by the Americans through the Canadian duty being so low.

Mr. Charlton said that the Northwest on which the rest of the country had spent so much money, ought to look at the lumber question from a broad point of view and consider the general advantage. He did not think a duty would make any considerable increase in the cost of lumber in the west. However, if increased duties made the lumbermen of Minnesota and Wisconsin suffer he would be glad to see it because the head center of the American lumber trade is in that section. He said that the duty on reciprocity in lumber between Canada and the United States came from there. A duty might have a powerful and salutary influence in this connection in regard to future negotiations. Mr. Charlton asserted that the lumber industry was practically a unit in support of the proposed increase in duty. He said merely as a matter of sentiment he believed in putting on the duty and meeting the Americans as they met us.

Mr. Edwards, of Russell, the Rockland lumberman, who is a free trader of the out-and-out kind, vigorously opposed Mr. Charlton's stand. In connection with the claim that American lumbermen undersold Canadian lumbermen in the Canadian market, he pointed out that the Canadians who bought the lumber ought to be declared the farmer had not one iota of protection and never could so long as he had to sell his produce in a foreign market in competition with the world. However, he declared he would combat the injustice lumbermen labored under through other protective measures. It being 6 o'clock the debate on the lumber duty stopped, and, at the evening session, two or three private bills were advanced a stage and the house adjourned at 8:20.

FREDERICTON. Sportsmen's Show at Chicago Promises Well. The guides at the sportsmen's show, Chicago, were visited in their booth by 40,000 people. They distributed 6,000 booklets descriptive of Fredericton, 13,000 dealing with New Brunswick generally. Arrangements were made with a number of western sportsmen to visit New Brunswick next season. MADRAS SCHOOLS. Bill in Connection Taken Up in Committee. Fredericton, March 21--(Special)--The corporations committee of the legislature had under consideration this morning a bill to vest the property of the governor and trustees of the Madras school in the diocesan synod of Fredericton. The bill provides that the Diocesan Society shall pay to the Madras school at Shediac the sum of \$100 annually. Judge Hamilton, Rev. Mr. Burt and Mr. Shedd, and James McQueen, of the same place, appeared in support of the measure, and Bishop Kingston, Judge Barker and H. Lawrence Sturdee, of St. John, were on hand to oppose it.

At the conclusion of Mr. McQueen's remarks further consideration of the bill was deferred until afternoon. The promoter of the bill is Attorney General Pugsley. The committee met again at 4:30 and was addressed by Bishop Kingston, Sheriff Sturdee and Judge Barker, the latter having the floor when, at 6 o'clock, the committee recessed until eight. These gentlemen defended the act regarding the Madras school, passed at the last session of the legislature. It was after 8 o'clock when the committee resumed proceedings and Judge Barker continued. He claimed that the circumstances of the time made a change necessary. He had visited the Madras school. He read from a report made by a gentleman on a visit to the school. Rev. Mr. Burt had made matters a little better, but except as a representative of the Madras board, Mr. Burt had nothing to do with the school. It was the custom to give the rector and church wardens two or three good schools instead of a larger number of weak ones. The schools were established in places like St. John where a large number of scholars would be available to attend. Judge Hamilton followed Judge Barker and continued along the same lines as in the morning, also answering several arguments put forth by previous speakers. During the debate, some spirited and heated arguments took place between Judge Hamilton, Bishop Kingston and Sheriff Sturdee.

Government of Philippines. Washington, March 21--The transfer from the military to the civil government in the Philippines is expected to occur about June 30, according to calculations made at the war department upon information received from the Philippine Commission and General MacArthur. It is known that even where civil governments are being established by the Philippine commission the military will be necessary for some time to support the civil authorities. It is the intention of the military as far as possible, however, from any participation in the governments established and the soldiers will be more of a police than a military force. Wherever possible native police will be organized.
